BONI TO WED DIVORCEE.

Former Husband of Anna Gould to Go to England for Bride. PARIS, Dec. 7.—Society here has it that Count Boni de Castellane, whom the former Anna Gould has recently divorced, will go to England, where, it is asserted, he will wed Mme Letillier, the divorced wife of Albert Meunier, a wealthy chocolate manufacturer. After being divorced by Albert Meunier, Mme. Letillier married Baron de Forest, the adopted son and heir of Baron Hirsch, the famous Australian railway magnate and now one of the wealthiest men in England. She is divorced from him also. Mme. Letillier was one of the most famous beauties of Paris. Mme. Letillier and Mme. Gould know each other well. The former is the daughter of the owner of the Paris Journal and is reported to be worth \$12,000,000.

The reply of Maitre Cruppi, counsel for Count Boni de Castellane and the former countess in the suit of their creditors, described how the tradesmen and usurers' bills had been cleverly mixed up and reiterated the willfulness of Mme. Gould to settle legitimate debts, although a delay was necessary, as there were no funds from the trustees of the estate at her disposal at present. Counsel argued that it was unjust and illegal to attempt to make Mme. Gould responsible for the enormous sums borrowed by Count Boni of usurers to meet his 'mad extravagances and princely prodigality.' Count Boni was the recipient yesterday of the most stinging and overwhelming rebuke ever administered to a member of the chamber of deputies when he ascended the tribune to make a speech. About half the deputies abruptly left the chamber, and the movement was so concerted that it appeared to have been evidently planned for the purpose of snubbing Castellane.

TRIAL IN MARCH.

M. K. Thaw, It is Now Reported, Will Get Long Postponement. NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Clifford W. Hartbridge, counsel for Harry K. Thaw, withdrew his motion asking for the appointment of a commission to take testimony in the Thaw case. Assistant District Attorney Garvan, who has charge of the Thaw case, is authority for the statement that the district attorney will oppose the withdrawal of the motion. The result of this will be that Thaw's trial will be delayed until March 1. Even should the commission not be appointed, the business of the district attorney's office has been so arranged that Thaw could not be put on trial until later than was originally planned. A report was in circulation that Miss Ada Vera Simonton was not in the African jungle studying monkey talk, but was in New York and had been in consultation with Assistant District Attorney Garvan. The young lady's mother says she is in west Africa and that the monkey talk story is pure nonsense.
