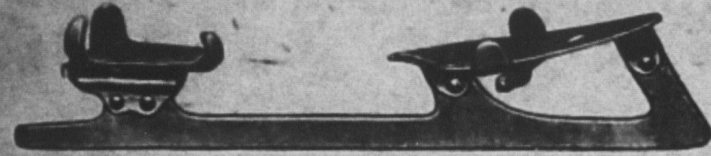

BOSTON CHARGED WITH ADULTERY

Peter H. Hopley is the Complainant in the case and he says that Boston Has Broken Up His Home.

Mart Boston, a mason by trade, will be given a hearing late this afternoon before Justice Carey on a charge of adultery preferred by Peter H. Hopley, formerly a resident of Owego, but who has recently been employed on a forest preserve in the Adirondack region.

Hopley alleges that his wife left their home in Owego several days ago and came to this place, bringing with her their household effects. He also says that she did not leave Owego alone but that she was accompanied by Boston, who is an alleged married man, and that they have since been occupying rooms in one of the concrete houses on South Keystone avenue.

Hopley with tears in his eyes tells the following story of his wife's unfaithfulness: He says that recently he secured a situation in the Adirondacks, and that about the 20th day of November he went there to go to work. His wife was to follow in a few days, but instead she packed up her own belongings and his, too, and came to Sayre. Learning of this he came to Sayre on Saturday and located his wife in the concrete block.

Last night in company with one of the night officers he went to the block and watched from the outside. Through a window he alleges that he saw enough to convince him that his wife was not alone in the house and that her companion was Boston whom Hopley charges with breaking up his home. Hopley and the officer went to Justice Carey's office and secured a warrant for the arrest of Boston, charging adultery. Armed with the document the two men again went to the block and kept watch until after midnight, then they demanded admittance.

Boston on hearing the officers at the door managed to escape to the roof of the block and would not come down until after Jay Lewis had persuaded him to do so by a little pistol display. Boston was lodged in the borough lockup until about 11 o'clock this morning when A. J. Green appeared before the justice and qualified in the sum of \$200 bail on which condition the prisoner was released until this afternoon.

Boston on hearing the officer at M. Dunham to defend him, while the interests of the prosecution will be looked after by Attorney C. C. Yocum. Several witnesses have been subpoenaed for the commonwealth and the case promises to be interesting.

Machinery for Shirt Factory is on the Ground But Operations Have Been Deferred.

The machinery for the branch establishment of the Elmira Shirt Manufacturing Company, which is to locate in the building formerly occupied by the Talmadge Plumbing Shop has arrived and is being installed. In the meantime the work of installing the machinery will go steadily on so as to be in readiness.

GILLETTE WILL DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Sentenced This Morning to Be Executed at Sing Sing Prison During the Week of January 25.

Herkimer, Dec. 10.—A motion for a new trial in the case of Chester Gillette, convicted of the murder of Grace Brown, was denied by the trial judge this morning. Gillette was immediately sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week beginning January 25. While the judge was pronouncing the words which condemned him to a felon's death, Gillette sat immovable, the same stolid demeanor being maintained that has characterized his every act during the trial.

He will be transferred to Sing Sing prison within ten days. Gillette, however, will probably not be executed on the date fixed by the court as Attorney Mills for the defense has stated all along that he will take the case to the court of appeals, in which event the appeal will act as a stay of execution. Gillette's mother and father have promised to be at his side in the event of his securing another trial.

SHIPWRECKED SAILOR WANTED ASSISTANCE.

But His Breath Smelled Bad and the Burgess Turned Him Down.

A middle-aged man, whose name was not ascertained, applied to Burgess Cross this morning for transportation to Patterson, N. J. at which place he said that he had friends. The man, who had the appearance of being foreigner, was wearing a bandage about his head and he stated that he had been severely injured in a shipwreck, which occurred on one of the great lakes. He applied to the hospital yesterday for treatment, and exhibited a wound in the head, which seemed to bear out his statement. He told the burgess of the injury to his head and then told him that if he had friends he should get to them at once. Therefore he wanted transportation, as he had no money. The burgess, however, sized his man up, analyzed the quality of his breath, concluded that it was a case of too much booze, and told the shipwrecked sailor that the borough had no way to provide for a case of this kind. The sailor was last seen going toward the Lehigh Valley railroad yards and it is presumed that another violation will be added to the railroad law which prohibits illegal riding on trains.

BRUTE CREATION HAS ITS OWN TROUBLES.

Pistol Bullet Ended Suffering of a Dog Which Had Evidently Been Injured in a Fight.

Dogs and animals appear to have their troubles as well as members of the human race, the only difference being the dumb brute is by nature prohibited telling its woes. Yesterday the truth of the former assertion was forcibly illustrated in the case of a fair-sized black and white canine that looked as if it had either been in a fight or had come in contact with a trolley car. The dog was first discovered sitting in the entrance way to Seager's grocery store. The left eye of the brute had been torn out, and his head and body were covered with innumerable lacerations from which the blood oozed freely.

The poor brute shivered in the cold, and his forlorn appearance excited the pity of those who observed his condition. Humanity demanded that the brute be put out of its misery. A bullet from Chief Walsh's pistol relieved the dog's suffering.

About Two Hundred Guests Sat Down to a Fine Banquet Friday Night.

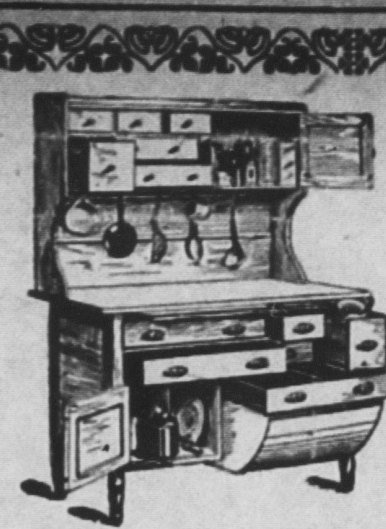
