HIDE FROM CHICAGO DRIVES MAN CRAZY.

Found on Broad Street Last Night in a State of Terror, Was Sent to New York Today.

Waverly—At about two o'clock this morning the night patrolman found a man on Broad street who appeared to be raving crazy. He seemed to be in mortal fear of somebody whom he seemed to think was after him for the purpose of doing him bodily harm. His terror was pitiable. He was covered with burdocks, and appeared to have travelled through the fields and brush. He was taken to the town hall and locked in a cell, but he continued his ravings, and tried to kill himself. The officers removed everything from him with which he might do himself injury, and even then it was necessary to hold him down for a time. He fell asleep at length, and this morning appeared to be rational. He proved to be an Italian, although neither his appearance or dialect would seem to indicate that such was his nationality.

He was brought before Justice Hoagland this morning, and when asked what was the matter with him last night he replied that he guessed that he was acting foolish and that he had ridden so far that it had made him crazy. He said that he left Chicago last Monday night, and was going to New York but could not tell where he had left train, nor what road he came into Waverly over. He had a ticket in his hat that the conductor had given him. When the ticket was shown to the Erie and Lackawanna agents they said it was not such as is used by their roads, and he was sent to Sayre. The officials there said it was their ticket, and he was sent on to the Metropolis.

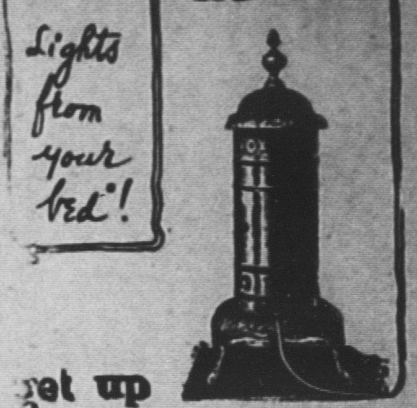
