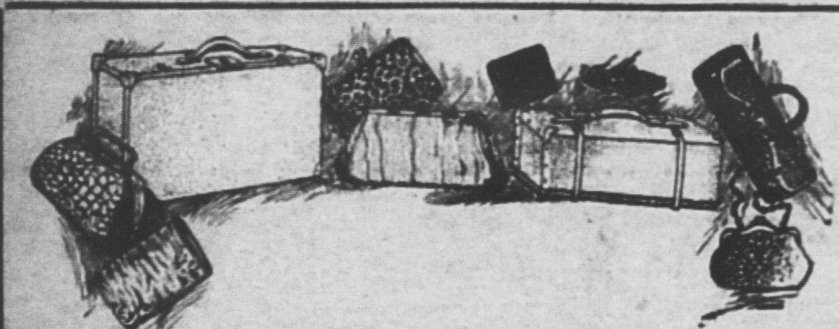

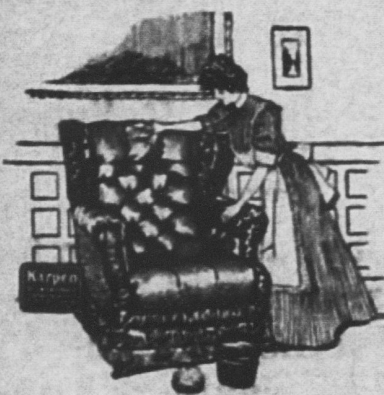

## OFFICIAL RETURNS.

In New York State Judges and State Electors.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Complete and official returns of the vote cast for state officers in every county of New York state in the recent state election show that the entire Democratic state ticket except its candidate for governor was elected. Charles E. Hughes, Republican candidate for governor, was elected by a plurality of 57,973. The pluralities for the Democratic candidates for the state offices below that of governor ranged from 5,443 for Chanler to 14,250 for Martin H. Glynn, the Democratic candidate for comptroller.

The pluralities of the other Democratic candidates were as follows: John B. Wahlen, for secretary of state, 5,504; Julius Hauser, for treasurer, 11,007; William R. Jackson, for attorney general, 10,645; Frederick W. Skene, for state engineer, 10,549.

### SHEA'S TRIAL.

Star Witness Kelly Says Prisoner Wanted a Dynamic Handler.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—Evidence was brought in the Shea trial here that President Shea during the strike of the teamsters seriously considered the use of dynamite as a means of winning the strike.

Michael Kelly, who was in charge of one of the squads of pickets, testified that Shea asked him if he knew of anybody who could handle dynamite. He also said that knives were given out to the pickets with instructions that they were to be used on colored men who had taken the places of the strikers and also for the purpose of cutting harnesses.

The attorneys for the defense made a strong fight against the admission of this testimony of Kelly, but Judge Ball decided that it was admissible.

### BROWN SINKING FAST.

Ex-Senator's Children at Bedside in Washington Hospital.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—A telegram was received at the hospital from Mrs. Annie C. Adams, mother of Maude Adams, asking to be notified at New York of the condition of former Senator Brown.

Mr. Brown's son and daughter, who have visited him constantly since the shooting, were at the bedside in the hospital ward. Though his vitality was weakening fast, he was conscious and assured the children that he would live.

Mrs. Bradley, who is still in a cell at the house of detention, when told the former senator was slowly sinking expressed herself as deeply shocked.

### Old Time Whisky Has No "Jim Jams"

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 12.—Colonel Thompson, who spoke for the straight whisky interests at the pure food hearing, engaged the interest of the commissioners and the audience from the beginning. "People who drank the old time whisky," said Colonel Thompson, "did not have stomach disorders as they have now from drinking rectified whisky. An old whisky is better than a new. The older it is the better and more wholesome it is. Before the introduction of whiskies made from high wines or rectified cologne spirits with oils and flavoring extracts a man never had the 'jim jams.' He never drank to excess. His wife allowed him to stay at home. One drink did not create a thirst for another. The average man did not get drunk." He then explained the process by which this whisky is made.
