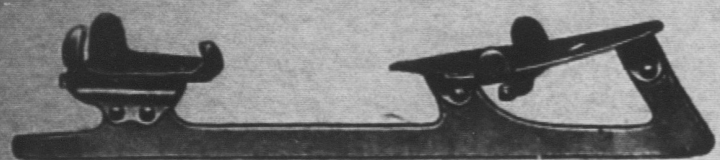

JEWELRY STORE IN HANDS OF SHERIFF

Business Place Conducted by F. W. G. Bartlett Closed Last Night on a Judgment Note.

Last night Sheriff Griffin came to Sayre and levied on the entire stock of jewelry and fixtures in the store which has been conducted by F. W. G. Bartlett on lower Desmond street for the past five years. The sheriff was armed with what is known in legal parlance as a "f. fa." which was issued by the prothonotary on a judgment note given by Mr. Bartlett to the First National Bank of Sayre about three months ago. About that time Mr. Bartlett made a settlement with his creditors. He was involved to the extent of about \$9,000, but succeeded in arranging for a settlement so that this amount was reduced to little over \$6,000. The First National bank took an assignment of these claims and advanced the money with which to liquidate them. Bartlett then gave his judgment note to secure the bank, and at the same time entered into an agreement where by F. T. Page was to take charge of the store and stock. In connection with this agreement Mr. Bartlett was to remain in the store, conduct the business as formerly, and turn over to the bank the proceeds of the sales, less the amount required to successfully conduct the business. The money thus turned over to the bank was to apply on Bartlett's indebtedness to that institution, and at the expiration of six months from the date of the agreement he was to have the privilege of buying the stock back.

The contract will not expire until some time in February, but it appears that the bank has recently felt that it was insecure and accordingly instructions were given to the prothonotary to issue on the judgment note. Sheriff Griffin closed the doors of the store last night and has advertised the stock and fixtures for sale. The store is up-to-date and contains a fine stock of goods. Mr. Bartlett came here about five years ago, and during this time has made many friends, all of whom will regret that he has suffered financial reverses. It is thought that he will be able to effect a settlement of the matter before the goods are sold at sheriff's sale.

JOSEPH SULLIVAN'S FUNERAL HELD TODAY.

Remains Were Taken to Tioga Point Cemetery for Interment. The funeral of Joseph Sullivan, who was killed in the East Waverly yards of the Lehigh Valley on Wednesday morning, was held this afternoon from his late home on Hayden street. Rev. Ira Hotelling of the Baptist church, Rev. C. E. Petrie of the Presbyterian church, and the Rev. Hannah, rector of the Church of the Redeemer, officiated at the obsequies. The funeral was in charge of J. W. Grumme's undertaking establishment, and the remains were taken to Tioga Point cemetery for interment.

LYMAN HEEMAN JR., SENT TO HUNTINGTON.

He Pleaded Guilty to Several Charges of Petty Theft. Lyman Heeman, Jr., who was arrested here on a charge of stealing brass and copper from the Lehigh Valley, and pending his removal to the county jail, escaped through the roof of the borough lockup, was sent to the reformatory at Huntington yesterday by Judge Fanning. Heeman pleaded guilty to several charges of petty theft.

Will Be Buried Tomorrow.

The funeral of the late William R. terday afternoon will be held Sunday afternoon, at the Church of the Redeemer at two o'clock. The Fraternal Order of Eagles of which the deceased was a member will probably arrange to attend in a body. The interment will take place at Tioga Point cemetery.

STEVENSON DIED OF STOMACH TROUBLE.

Autopsy Performed Yesterday Showed Ulcers in That Organ—Death Would Have Resulted in a Few Days of Peritonitis.

Yesterday afternoon Doctors Fish, Cummings and Lynn performed an autopsy on the body of William R. Stevenson, whose somewhat sudden death was recorded in yesterday's issue of this paper. The result of the autopsy showed the presence of ulcers in the lining of the stomach. Some of them had apparently begun to heal, but one of them was quite extensive and had already eaten through the organ. The physicians state that had the heart of the deceased not given out general septic peritonitis would have resulted in a few days. The autopsy was performed at the request of relatives of Mr. Stevenson, they being anxious to know what was the cause of death.

MRS. C. E. KNAPP DIED YESTERDAY

She Had Been an Invalid for Over Two Years.

Mrs. C. E. Knapp, wife of the well known Lehigh Valley engineer, expired at her home on Olive street yesterday afternoon at 2:45 o'clock after an illness which has covered a period of two years. Last spring Mrs. Knapp was taken to the hospital, it being thought that she was suffering from cancer of stomach. The physicians at that institution determined that the case was an operative one, and that she was afflicted with periculous anemias. She returned to her home and for a time seemed to improve, but recently her condition became alarmingly, and for two days previous to her death she was in a state of coma.

Mrs. Knapp's maiden name was Myrtle B. Evelin, she being the daughter of Mr. and S. H. Evelin of Keystone avenue. She was 36 years old and had resided in Sayre for a period of 17 years, and was highly respected by those who knew her. She is survived by her husband, her father and mother and one brother, John Evelin, the latter a resident of Jersey Shore. The funeral will be from her late home on Sunday afternoon, burial at Tioga Point cemetery.

MUNN AND SMITH ARE HELD TO COURT.

Both Men Are Charged With Cutting Timber Trees Without the Consent of the Owner.

James Smith and Arthur Munn, charged by T. P. Maney with having stolen and carried away a quantity of lumber and wood from his property on the east side of the Susquehanna river, were discharged at a hearing held yesterday afternoon before Justice Carey. At a subsequent hearing, however, both men were held to the next court of quarter sessions on a charge of cutting and removing timber trees, and removing the same without the consent of the owner of the property on which they were cut. This is the second time that Smith has been proceeded against on account of cutting and carrying away timber from Mr. Maney's property. Smith had a contract for cutting a strip of woodland 200 feet back of the river, but Mr. Maney claims that he exceeded his contract and has cut trees on certain sections of the land not included in the contract. Smith was arrested once before and was held to the grand jury on a charge of larceny but they failed to indict, on the ground presumptively that trees are part of the reality and therefore incapable of theft. The charge on which Smith was held to the grand jury yesterday, is framed under a special act which makes it a misdemeanor to cut and carry away growing trees from another man's property. C. C. Yocum, Esq., appeared for Mr. Maney, while the defendants' interests were represented by Attorney A. L. Laws.
