INVOLVED IN DISPUTE KNOCKS OUT OPPONENT.

Reports of Injured Man's Death Proved to Be Very Much Exaggerated. Waverly—Yesterday afternoon Thomas McMahon and a man from Sayre named Michael Loftus became involved in a dispute and ended with McMahon striking Loftus, knocking him to the ground and rendering him unconscious.

It seems that the trouble started near hotel Fulton. Chief Brooks went over to clear the crowd from the side walk when Loftus ran up to him, and pointing McMahon out demanded that he be arrested. He said that McMahon had some papers that belonged to the Pennsylvania side of the line as the chief approached, and Loftus was informed by the chief that he could not make the arrest in Pennsylvania, and that he would have to get a warrant. After the trouble seemed to have passed the chief left, going to the Erie station.

Loftus followed McMahon over the line, the argument was continued and ended by Loftus being knocked down. His head struck the curb stone and he was rendered unconscious. During the confusion McMahon left the vicinity and has not been seen since. Loftus was unconscious for nearly an hour. Dr. Griswold was called, and it was thought that his skull was fractured. Friends took Loftus to his home in Sayre.

This morning the rumor was current that Loftus had died as the result of the injury. Investigation showed however, that such was not the case, but that he had nearly recovered from its effects.
