SHOT BRIDEGROOM DEAD.

W. F. Bywaters Killed by Two Brothers Near Culpepper, Va.

CULPEPPER, Va., Dec. 17.—William F. Bywaters, a prominent citizen of this county and well known all over the country as a fox hunter and breeder of crack hounds and horses, was literally shot to pieces here by James and Phillip Strothers, who live at "Rotherwood," three miles from this place.

Mr. Bywaters secured a marriage license and was married to Miss Viola Strothers, daughter of the late Colonel John B. Strothers and sister of the two young Strothers who killed him at her home. After the wedding Mr. Bywaters attempted to leave the Strothers house, and one of the brothers of the bride objected.

Bywaters later climbed to the roof and endeavored to escape. He was seen by James and Phillip Strothers, who opened fire on him with pistols. He died almost instantly. The circumstances surrounding the killing are sensational and have aroused the greatest excitement.

Expedition to South America.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 17.—One of the most important ethnological expeditions in the history of Harvard university left today, under the leadership of Dr. W. C. Farabee, for South America to make an investigation among the Indian tribes of the Andes mountains. Besides Dr. Farabee, the party will include Mrs. Farabee, J. L. De Milhau and J. W. Hastings of the Peabody museum.

Her Apparent at Teheran.

TEHERAN, Dec. 17.—The condition of the shah is unchanged. All Mirza heir apparent to the throne, arrived in Teheran at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. He was met outside the city by the Persian war minister, Naib es Sultaneh, a brother of the shah, who warmly welcomed him, and together they drove to the palace, where they now are with the shah.

Storm Spreeds Over Four States.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 17.—The heaviest snowstorm of the winter was general over southwestern Missouri, southeastern Kansas and parts of Oklahoma and Indian Territory last night. The snow ranges in depth from two to six inches. Much suffering has resulted from the storm in certain parts of Oklahoma, where a fuel famine prevails.

Settlement Reached With Porto Rico.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Dec. 17.—The differences between the federal and insular governments over the division of the public lands in Porto Rico have been amicably adjusted, subject to the approval of the secretary of the navy. Captain Samuel C. Lemly, U. S. N., retired, represented the navy in the adjustment.

Pennsylvania Flier Wrecked.

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 17.—The Pennsylvania flier, eastbound, struck a freight train on the Wheeling and Lake Erie railroad at a crossing a few miles west of Canton, O., last night, derailing both trains and slightly injuring the engineer and fireman of the flier. Several passengers are reported killed and a number injured.
