KANSAS CITY, Dec. 18.—With coal selling in Tonopah at \$90 a ton and the heaviest made to get fuel at any price because the railroads say there is a shortage of cars, there are more than 4,000 empty cars standing on side tracks in Kansas City alone. Reports from various railroad division points in Missouri and Kansas indicate that cars are plentiful in both states.

Run on Columbia Trust Company. MIDDLETOWN, Conn., Dec. 18.—The run of three days on the Columbia Trust company here came to an end, only a few depositors withdrawing their money, while a large number of depositors returned money. Rumors that the company was about to fail started the run.

Burham Gets Two Years' Sentence. NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Justice Greenbaum in the criminal branch of the supreme court sentenced George Burham, Jr., general counsel and vice president of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance company, to serve two years in Sing Sing prison at hard labor.

Burham was convicted of grand larceny last week. He was indicted on five counts, and four of them are still pending. Frederick A. Burnham, president, and George B. Eldridge, a vice president of the company, are also under indictment.

Five Tars Drowned Off Portsmouth. PORTSMOUTH, England, Dec. 18.—Nine sailors belonging to the crew of the battleship Hindustan were drowned off here, owing to the upsetting of a cutter in which they were returning to the warship. There were forty men in the cutter, and all were thrown into the water. Owing to a heavy fog boats in the vicinity had difficulty in rescuing thirty-one of the sailors. Many of these were unconscious when picked up.

Way Mattox Caused Southern Wreck. WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The official investigation of the Southern railway into the rear-end collision which occurred at Lawyers, Va., on Thanksgiving day and in which President Spencer of the Southern and six others, including a number of prominent people, lost their lives has been concluded and the responsibility for the wreck placed on G. D. Mattox, block operator at Ringoon Station, Va.

New Coal Devies For Warships. WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The battleship Iowa has left Norfolk for some point on the Atlantic, where she will meet the collier Abarenda and conduct a series of tests with a new device for cooling ships at sea.
