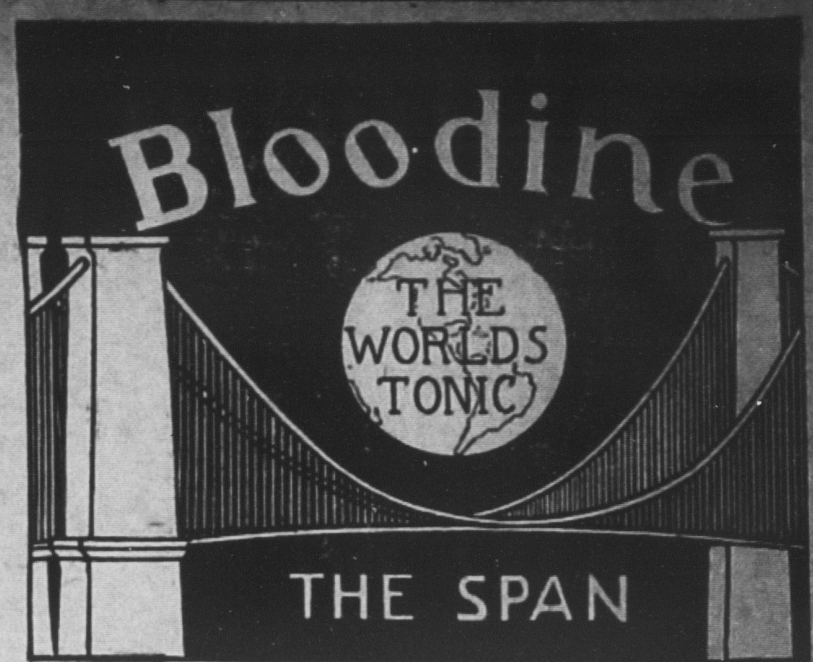

TOWN OF BARTON TAX RATE LOWEST IN THE COUNTY.

Rate Fixed at \$4.50 per \$100—Shows Good Management.

Waverly—The Barton town board met yesterday at Clerk C. H. Turney's office and the tax rate for the year was fixed at \$4.50 on one thousand dollars valuation, the lowest rate in the history of the town and the lowest rate in Tioga county. Some of the towns running as high as nine dollars per thousand. The above speaks volumes for the business ability of supervisor Frank L. Howard and his colleagues on the town board. Notwithstanding the low rate the roads are now in better condition than ever before. Opera House at Paterson Destroyed. PATERSON, N. J., Dec. 13.—Fire that originated in the Butler Opera House destroyed that building as well as the two adjoining structures, causing a loss of about \$250,000. In a hardware store under the opera house was stored a large quantity of powder. By heroic work on the part of the firemen some of the powder was taken from the building. The remainder exploded and aided the flames in the destruction of the theater.

Wreck on Atlantic Coast Line. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 13.—Atlantic Coast Line passenger train No. 82, northbound from Tampa, collided head on with a southbound extra freight near McGuiness creek, seven miles from Jacksonville, killing Claid Bailey and injuring a number of others, one of whom may die. The express, mail and baggage cars of the passenger train were telescoped, and five gondola coal cars were piled on top of them.

Harry L. Taylor Succeeds Emery. ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 19.—Governor Higgins announced that he would appoint Harry L. Taylor of Buffalo as county judge of Erie county to fill the vacancy caused by the election of County Judge Edward K. Emery to the supreme court bench. Mr. Taylor for a long time has been identified with professional baseball and was president of the Eastern league for one year. He is a trustee of Cornell university.
