PROPERTY OWNERS RAISE OBJECTIONS TO STREET.

Petitions Are Presented For and Against the Proposed Broad and Ithaca Street Connection.

Waverly—The hearing of the taxpayers in regard to the proposed new street extending from Broad street to Ithaca street was held last night before the village trustees as required by law. Patrick Sheehan and Nelson Lyons whose property would be crossed by the new street appeared and personally objected to the new street and Mr. Lyons stated that five out of the six property owners, whose lands were effected were against the new street. Petitions containing 72 names were submitted, opposing the new street. L. F. Lord spoke in favor of it. The argument against the street was that there were plenty of building lots available and it was needless to put the village to the expense which would be incurred.

The matter was put over till the regular meeting. A petition signed by the necessary taxpayers was submitted to the board asking that Howard street be extended east to Cayuta avenue. A hearing will be held Jan. 6th at 7:30 p. m.
