HELD TO COURT IN SUM OF \$300 BAIL

James Nichols Must Appear Before Judge Fanning on Charge of Failing to Provide For His Family.

Charged by his wife Helen with non-support James Nichols was held to court by Justice Carey last night in the sum of \$200 bail. Nichols gave bail in this amount and was released from custody. The hearing was resumed last night, a continuance having been taken for the purpose of permitting the husband and wife to arrange a mutual settlement. Nichols, however, could offer nothing more than "that he would do the best he could." As this arrangement would appear to offer Mrs. Nichols no security for the future Nichols was sent to court. The couple have been married 28 years. They have one married daughter, and she declares that her father never provided for his family as he ought. Attorney Paul E. Maynard represented the commonwealth last night, while A. L. Laws looked after the interests of the defendant.

Lehigh Valley Railroad News.

The Cambria Steel Co. has practically completed order for low side gondolas for the Lehigh Valley, having delivered 499. The one remaining car is expected at any time.

The Standard Steel Co. has completed delivery of 1,500 box cars to the Lehigh Valley Railroad.

The Lehigh Valley has recently received from the Perth Amboy Dry Dock company four grain boats, the boats delivered are part of an order for 10 placed by the Lehigh Valley some time ago.

The Lehigh Valley has ordered from the Standard Steel Car Company, 1,000 additional steel underframe box cars.

The above-named Company has completed delivery of 1,000 twin hopper bottom gondolas cars to the Lehigh Valley.

The Lehigh Valley Railroad has just received from the American Locomotive Works, 3 of the Atlantic type locomotives on an order for 5, which was placed some time ago for December delivery.

LEHIGH RAISES ITS DIVIDEND TO 6 PER CENT.

At a Meeting of Board of Directors Held Yesterday.

In keeping with the anticipation, the board of directors of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company yesterday increased the dividend on the common stock by declaring the regular semi-annual payment of 2 per cent, and adding one per cent "extra." This places the stock on a six per cent basis as against four per cent heretofore.

INSTANTLY KILLED NEAR CHEMUNG

Erie Train No. 3 Struck Rig on Holbert's Crossing, Killing Both Horses and Driver.

Erie passenger train No. 2, running an hour behind its regular schedule struck a team driven by A. Pruyn at Holbert's crossing about one mile of Chemung, about one o'clock this afternoon. Pruyn and both horses were instantly killed. The wagon which was loaded with wood was completely demolished.

Holbert's crossing is one of the most dangerous along the Erie. Pruyn, who worked on the Roberts farm near Chemung, was on his way to Waverly. As he approached the crossing he failed to see the train, his vision being obstructed by a row of trees. The horses were crushed, frightfully and when the engine arrived at Waverly the pilot was found to be covered with blood and pieces of horse-flesh. Pruyn was thrown several feet from the tracks. His head was crushed and he met death instantly. His body was taken to the Erie depot at Chemung where the coroner was called. Despite the fact that the crossing was dangerous this is the first accident to have occurred on it in years.

CROUP CAUSES DEATH OF TWO INFANTS.

Edna May Roll and Pasquale Altieri, Both Died Yesterday of the Same Disease.

Edna May Roll, an infant a little over one month old, died of croup at the home of Mrs. Victoria McBride, at No. 114 North River street yesterday afternoon. The funeral will be held from the house tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Burial at Tio-ga Point cemetery. The arrangements are in charge of Grumme's undertaking establishment.

Pasquale Altieri, the two months' old child of Michael Altieri of Holly street, died yesterday at the home of its parents of croup. The funeral was held this morning, burial in the Catholic cemetery.

HAKES FELL ON SLIPPERY SIDEWALK.

And Received Numerous Bruises and Contusion on the Face.

Fred Hakes, the well known carpenter, who left this morning for Baltimore, met with quite a serious accident yesterday afternoon. Mr. Hakes was going to his home on Frederick street. He was carrying an armful of groceries and was wearing a pair of shoes which were very smooth on the bottom part of the soles. He slipped on the stone pavement and fell forward, his face striking the pavement, inflicting several bruises. This morning when he departed both eyes were nearly swollen shut. It was a decidedly narrow escape from more serious injury.

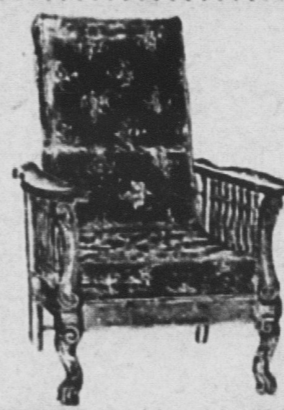

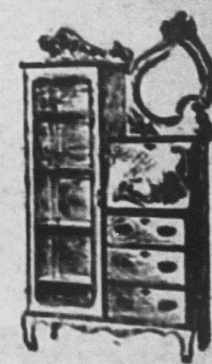
