He Was Once an Inmate of Libby Prison.

Athens-Good old chaplain McCabe is dead. The bright sunny soul that we loved and honored so much for his sterling manly qualities and courageous disposition. Chaplains in the army were not always respected as highly as their official dignity would indicate for they were not all like dear old Chaplain C. C. McCabe. He went out with the 122nd Ohio regiment and they were under the command of that intrepld fighter Milroy at Winchester when Jenkins came down upon them with an overpowerthe disastrous folly of resisting a superior force and instead of bowing to the inevitable he set his foot down determined to hold the ground against the whole rebel army. The consequences was that his patriotic army was gobbled up and Chaplain Mc-Cabe found so much to do caring for the wounded men that he was made a prisoner. We have heard him tell his story after he escaped from Libby prison and it was very funny. He told the rebel officer that he was only a preacher and that he was there to take care of the wounded men, and didn't want to go to Richmond. They replied "You are just the kind of fellow we want. You have been preaching against us many years and shouting 'On to Richmond' and now we propose to make you travel that road." So he found himself in Libby prison amongst the crowd of suffering comrades where he was confined four months. His sunny countenance and happy disposition worked wonders with the boys and their lonliness and distress was very greatly relieved by his efforts. After Col. Streight engineered his famous tunnel through, which so many escaped, Chaplain McCabe came to our camp in Virginia and told the story, and we all threw up our hats and sung "Glory Hallelujah." He has lectured in Athens and his story has always been just as good as new and we felt the thrill of old time patriotism whenever he told it. He surely was
