VALLEY DEFENDANT IN BIG DAMAGE SUIT

Widow of Sydney R. Loomis Who Was Killed in Sayre Shops, Sues to Recover the Sum of \$25,000.

"Jeanie Loomis, to the use of herself, Martin M. Loomis, Effie Loomis, Georgia Loomis, Reta R. Loomis, Sidney Loomis, Harlan Loomis, widow and children of Sydney R. Loomis, versus the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company," is the title of a suit which was commenced in the Court of Common Pleas at Towanda on Saturday. The plaintiffs in the case are the widow and children of Sydney R. Loomis who was instantly killed in the Lehigh shops at this place on the 14th of September last. Loomis was caught underneath a falling crane and was crushed to death. The plaintiff in her complaint alleges that a chain which had supported the crane was defective, and that on account of this defect, knowing it to exist, the company is guilty of negligence. The action is begun in trespass and \$25,000 damages is claimed. Attorneys Maynard, Maynard & Schrier are attorneys for the plaintiff, and on Saturday last Paul E. Maynard, representing the firm, went to Towanda and filed the declaration. The suit will be an interesting one from a legal standpoint and its outcome will settle just how far a company is liable for injuries received by employees.

INCREASED WAGES FOR LEHIGH VALLEY ENGINEERS.

According to the New Book of Rules They Will Benefit By the Adjustment of the New Schedule.

According to the new book of rules issued by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company the engineers will receive a substantial benefit when the wage scale is adjusted. Under the new arrangement, engineers on yard and mine shifts, will be given ten hours a day with the same rate of wages as now prevail.

Engineers who work five hours or less shall receive one-half day's pay for each hour all who work more than five hours and 30 minutes will be given a day's pay.

Whenever engineers are called to report for work, and the train is cancelled, one-fourth of a day will be allowed, and the engineers so called stand first out.

Passenger train helping engineers between Wilkes-Barre and Mauch Chunk shall be paid at the rate of \$3.75 per day. Overtime shall be paid after 12 hours and 30 minutes.

In the future workmen who operate trains between Sayre and Lehigh-ton shall be given \$5.88 per trip. All engineers employed on No. 1 engines, slow freights, between Wilkes-Barre and Coxton to Penn Haven Junction and return will receive \$4.20 per trip. Formerly the engineers on the latter engines were paid by the day and the trip amounted to about \$3.66 per day. Only the engineers are effected by this new schedule.

Mrs. Mary Peters.

Mrs. Mary Peters, widow of the late William Peters, who was formerly a conductor on the Lehigh, expired at her home in Milltown at 7:30 o'clock this morning, aged 70 years. She had been ill for a long time. Her remains will be taken to Scranton tomorrow morning for burial. A short prayer service will be held at the house this evening.

FATALLY INJURED AT THE ROUNDHOUSE

Peter O'Connell Frightfully and Fatally Crushed in the Electric Turn Table.

Peter O'Connell, an employe of the Lehigh Valley round house at this place, met with a fearful accident last night shortly after eight o'clock, which resulted in his death at the hospital a few hours later.

O'Connell was engaged by the company as an engine oiler, and last night he was working about engine 1550 which had been backed on the electric turn table. O'Connell was carrying a torch and it went out. He went to another torch which was standing near the pilot of the engine to get a light. As he reached down to light the torch the turn table began to move. O'Connell's left leg was caught between the table and the rail and was crushed to a jelly. His right leg was also broken before the table was stopped. He was hurried to the hospital but his injuries were of such a nature that an operation was useless. He died from the shock about 11 o'clock.

The dead man was 22 years of age and came from Ireland to this country last May. He resided with his brother Joseph O'Connell, and during the time that he had been employed by the Lehigh had made many friends. The funeral arrangements which are in charge of Loomis and O'Shea, have not as yet been made.

The funeral will be held Wednesday morning at the Church of the Epiphany. P. H. O'Shea is in charge of the arrangements.

ROBBERY LEHIGH FREIGHT CARS.

Geneva Youths Admitted Their Guilt and Are Sent to a Reformatory.

On Monday last a Lehigh Valley box car at Geneva was broken open and the thieves secured a quantity of knives, skates, skate straps, and other merchandise. On Thursday another car was entered and another lot of loot was secured. Yardmaster Toole saw four boys near the cars and gave chase. The boys eluded pursuit, but on Saturday Detective Shaffer went to Geneva and after several hours of hard work located a part of the stolen property. He also caused the arrest of Lewis, Fred and Alfred Gaylord and Michael Higgins. They were charged with robbing the cars and admitted it. The police judge sent them to Father Baker's Reformatory at Buffalo. Their parents were present in court and pleaded so hard that the judge permitted the boys to go home over Christmas. On Thursday they will be sent to Buffalo.

DEATH OF A WELL KNOWN CITIZEN

Reed Bosworth Camp Died at His Home in This Place Yesterday.

Reed Bosworth Camp, one of Sayre's best known and most highly respected citizens, died yesterday at his home on Olive street. Though in poor health for a long time Mr. Camp did not give up work until one week ago Saturday when he was compelled to go home. He was a sufferer from asthma, and this disease brought on heart failure which resulted in death.

The deceased had been a resident of Sayre for over 14 years. He was an expert watchmaker and for 12 years had been connected with I. A. Samuels' jewelry store. He was a man of exemplary character and was held in high esteem by his fellow men. About a year ago his wife died, and since that time he has been in failing health. He was born in Camp-town, this county, in 1840, and was therefore 66 years old.

He is survived by four daughters Mrs. Verner Frame of Philadelphia, Mrs. R. C. Annear of VanEtten, Mrs. Anthony Hawk of Sayre, and Mrs. Utley Teed, also of this place. All of his daughters were at his bedside when death came. The funeral will be held from his late home on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. J. F. Warner, officiating. The remains will be taken to Tioga Point for interment.

INDIGESTION CAUSED CHILD'S DEATH.

Autopsy Showed Stomach to Be Badly Inflamed—Was Ill Only a Few Hours.

Acute indigestion followed by paralysis of the heart caused the death of Alfred, the three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Wildrick of Tuscarora street on Saturday night at 6:45 o'clock. During the morning the child ate a piece of Bologna sausage and at noon time it again secured a piece of cold meat. About five o'clock in the afternoon it was taken suddenly ill and Dr. C. A. Haines was hurriedly sent for. When he arrived he found the child in convulsions. The body was rigid, and the physician suspected ptomaine poisoning. He administered remedies and about six o'clock left the little fellow apparently better. Shortly thereafter the physician received a telephone message stating that the child had died. Not satisfied as to the cause of death Dr. Haines asked permission to perform a post mortem. The request was granted and yesterday morning Carlisle Haines, who is a student at the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Baltimore, performed the work, with the assistance of his father and Dr. A. H. Murray. The stomach of the child was found to be badly inflamed; the process of digestion had entirely ceased, and the left cavity of the heart was filled with blood.

The parents of the child are prostrated with grief. The funeral arrangement are not yet completed.

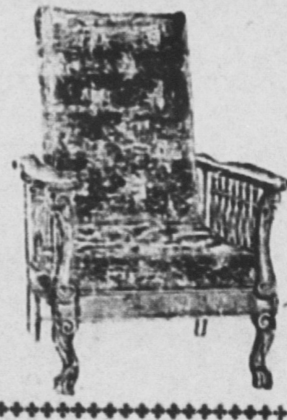
