SOUTHERN PACIFIC STRIKE.

Road is Moving Trains and Accepting Freight as Usual.

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 27.-Reports to the headquarters of the Atlantic system of the Southern Pacific show that the lines are experiencing little difficulty in operating trains on account of the strike of the locomotive firemen on the Houston division of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio line.

In view of the successful operation of trains, as indicated, Traffic Manager C. K. Dunlap has issued notices at all points to accept both local and through freight for transportation over the lines of the company.

At Lobo, near El Paso, Engineer Kutz is reported to have been assaulted by Brakeman Binger and so severely injured that he could not continue the run.

H. E. Willis, assistant grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, says that his organization is thoroughly satisfied with the situation, and all its members are going to do all possible to maintain their contract with the railroad company and to keep trains moving.

A Southern Pacific fireman was taken from a locomotive by masked men at Opelousas, La. The fireman's strike has caused no serious trouble. Two guards are carried on every locomotive, and all passenger and local freights have been moved on time.

VARDAMAN AT SCOOPA.

Governor of Mississippi Takes News Troops to Troubled District.

SCOOPA, Miss., Dec. 27.-Governor Vardaman and several members of his staff have arrived here with a force of light guards under command of Captain Albert Fairley, Adjutant General Fridge is with the party.

The governor found that there had been no fresh outbreaks at Scooba, but it had been impossible for him to get any definite news at Jackson, and he came here to make a personal investigation and relieve the strain on Colonel McCants' soldiers with fresh troops.

There is much excitement among the negroes in the vicinity of the town. The officer says he will march on any negroes who threaten a demonstration. News from Crawford, Miss., where Conductor Harrison was killed by a negro, states that a posse is chasing blacks believed to have been connected with the killing.

C., to attend the grand reunion of the blue and the gray at Fort Fisher on the anniversary of the battle for the fort. An invitation has been extended to the One Hundred and Seventeenth New York volunteers, but to all who wore the blue at that battle and their friends, by the "Confederate Survivors of Fort Fisher association." The Utica party will leave here Jan. 13.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 27.-The condition of former United States Senator Donelson Caffery, who has been ill for a week with acute kidney trouble, took a turn for the worse, and it is feared that he will not recover.

TO THE MEMORY OF 233 GOOS

Anti-Vivisection Fountain Erected at Battersea, Near London.

London-The anti-vivisectionists of England have recently given expression to their feelings through the erection of a monument at Battersea, near London. It is a granite fountain built under the direction of the International Vivisection society and consists of a column surrounded by a circular basin surmounted by a bronze model of a dog sitting up and taking notice. Graven in the stone above the drinking trough is this inscription:

"To the memory of the brown terrier done to death in the laboratory of the University college after having en-

dured more than two months of vivisection, having been handed over from one vivisectionist to another until death came to his release."

On the base of the monument below the trough the inscription continues thus: "And to the memory of the 232 dogs vivisected at the same place during the year 1902. Men and women of England, how long shall these things last?"

At the dedication of the monument several speeches were made and an anthem, "Ring the Bells of Pity," was sung.

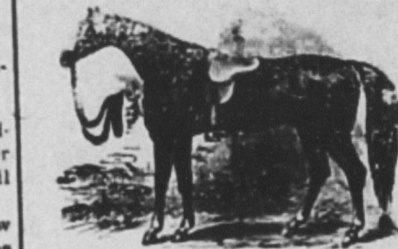
