REGULAR BOY HANDICAP.

A Good Thing That Went Wrong at New Orleans Track.
NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 28.—Belle Storme, a heavily played favorite in the fifth race at the Fair grounds, was disqualified for interference with Frodoe and Jockey Martin, riding Belle Storme, was suspended for three days for rough riding.
The feature event was the New Year preliminary handicap for two-year-olds over the seven furlong course and drew out the very cream of the young brigade. Another handicap, fourth on the card, at a mile, filled almost equally well. The others were well above the average.

A good thing that went wrong saddened the hearts of the bettors in the opening race and added more than a few thousands to the already heavy strong boxes of the bookies. Chase, with Garner up, looked an almost unshakable combination to the talent in the first race, a six furlong affair, and he went to the post a strong even money favorite. Western, which received some play at 5 to 1, upset all calculations, however, by running one of his best races, and just beat out the favorite in the run to the wire. Zick Abrams was a fair third. Brown Leads Chess Tournament.
NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Brown university is in the lead in the annual tournament of the Triangular College Chess league between two students each from Brown, Pennsylvania and Cornell. The Pennsylvanian took second place. The score to date is: Brown, won 3, lost 1; Pennsylvania, won 2, lost 2; Cornell, won 1, lost 3.

Miller Was on Come and Alma Boy.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—Jockey W. Miller at Oakland won two out of four races, the first winner being Come, an almost prohibitive favorite, and the second Alma Boy. The track was sloppy. The last race furnished an exciting finish; a half dozen horses coming to the wire in a bunch.

Avontellus at Ascot.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 28.—McDaniel landed two firsts and a second at Ascot. In the third race Avontellus ran a good race and came with a rush at the end. The sixth race developed into a contest between Merlingo and Cigar Lighter.

Result of a Crap Game.
SELMA, Ala., Dec. 28.—Two white men have been badly injured, two negroes killed and a third negro wounded in a shooting scrape near Nicholasville. Alexander Jones, a young negro, shot and wounded another negro during a crap game. Jones fled and barricaded himself in his house. Leo Pope and Zeke Pope, white men, attempted to arrest Jones, when the negro opened fire, wounding both. A crowd of white men gathered, and efforts were made to drive the young negro from his house. Bob Jones, father of Alexander, tried to carry ammunition to his son and was shot dead. Several negroes joined the besieging party, and one negro for a reward of \$5 crept up to the house and set fire to it. Alexander Jones never left the house and was burned to death in the flames. There was not the slightest rapture between the races, whites and blacks joining in the attempt to capture the negro.

Bonaparte Confers With Devils.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—United States District Attorney Robert F. Devlin of San Francisco, who was called to Washington by Attorney General Bonaparte for a conference regarding the exclusion of Japanese pupils from the public schools of San Francisco, arrived in this city last night and called at the department of Justice today. Mr. Devlin refused to discuss the Japanese question, declaring that the matter was in the hands of the attorney general and that any information given out would have to come from Mr. Bonaparte.

Young Football Captain Falls Dead.
JERSEY CITY, N. J., Dec. 28.—Richard Datterbeny, ten years old, fell dead here while playing football with his companions. Datterbeny captain of one team. The boy had secured the ball and attempted to make a goal. In the rush Datterbeny fell. The players hurried to his aid, but were unable to arouse him to consciousness. Dr. Finerty, who was summoned, pronounced the boy dead, probably from heart failure brought on by the excitement.

Foreman Under Sand in Tunnel.
NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Thomas Brown, a section foreman, is supposed to be buried under tons of sand in the Long Island City end of the Belmont East river tunnel. The laborers struck a fault in the earth, and the rush of water and sand drove them hurriedly from the shaft. Brown delayed to make sure of the escape of his men and was not seen after the accident.

Chicago Banker Jailed.
CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—W. J. Atkinson, the proprietor of the defunct Lincoln bank of Morton Park, was sent to jail in default of bonds amounting to \$25,000. The commitment of Atkinson followed a conference between Attorney Hinger, acting for the receiver, and United States Marshal Hoy.


