MILK THIEF IS CAUGHT IN THE ACT

Dixon Drank From Bottle While An Officer Looked On.

This morning about four o'clock Officer Julius Vogel saw a man drinking from a bottle near the corner of Desmond street and Packer avenue. The officer made an investigation and discovered that the man was drinking milk, an unusual occurrence for that hour of the morning. The officer asked the man where he got the milk and the man admitted having taken it from in front of the tailoring establishment conducted by Ed Peters. The man gave his name as William Dixon and he was escorted to the police station and this morning F. E. Kimmich, of the firm of Kimmich Brothers swore out a warrant for Dixon's arrest, charging him with stealing the milk. Dixon was arraigned before Justice Carey and the case was continued until three o'clock this afternoon.

From time to time the milk men in the valley enter complaints to the police that milk bottles, tickets, and in many cases money are taken from in front of dwellings, and persistent efforts have been made on the part of the officials to run down the guilty parties. The thiefing, however, is usually done at an early hour in the morning when nearly every one is asleep and it is an exceedingly difficult matter to catch the thieves. It is the purpose of the milk men, however, to conduct a vigorous campaign against the unlawful practice and all offenders will be dealt with severely.

MILLTOWN WOMAN DIED SUDDENLY.

Attacked By Paralysis While Driving to Waverly Yesterday Afternoon.

Mrs. Solomon Westfall of Milltown, sustained a stroke of paralysis while on her way to Waverly yesterday afternoon, and died shortly after at the home of Mrs. Margaret Wilkinson, a relative. Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Westfall and her son L. D. Westfall started to drive to Waverly. While on the way Mr. Westfall noticed that his mother was not acting as usual. He inquired if she was feeling well and she replied that she was. When they reached the home of Mrs. Wilkinson, however, it was necessary for her son to carry her into the house. A physician was called but she expired shortly afterwards, a stroke of paralysis being given as the cause of death.

Her body was removed to her home in Milltown at the corner of Bensley and Cayuta streets, Milltown, where she has resided for many years. She was 73 years of age and is survived by three sons, L. D. and Watson of this place, and Levi of Cogenac Lake, N. Y.

The funeral will be held from her late home on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock.

TELEGRAPHERS NOT PLEASED WITH RAISE.

Key Manipulators Say That Recent "Advance" in Wages Is Not Satisfactory.

Now it is said that the Lehigh Valley telegraph operators who were recently granted an increase in wages, are far from being satisfied with the advance. Outside of the towers \$2 per month increase appears to be the prevailing sum, instead of the flat \$10 per month as reported. It is also stated that the station agents did not receive an increase, and therefore there is some cause for dissatisfaction among this class of Lehigh employees. It is but natural to believe that the Pennsylvania and other roads which pay considerable higher wages will eventually secure a number of experienced telegraph key manipulators.

An electric light wire broke in two at the corner of Elmer avenue and Chemung street this morning. No damage was done.

Scranton is doubly afflicted. With nearly 1,000 cases of typhoid fever on hand, an epidemic of whooping cough has also appeared.

Letters of administration upon the estate of Josephine R. Vail, deceased, late of Sayre borough, have been granted to James R. Vail.

Robert A. Myer of Towanda, has been appointed auditor, to examine the dockets and accounts of the probatory and register and recorder.

The local freight crews on the Lehigh have been greatly relieved by the expiration of the busy season. There is much less freight to handle and the men are not all grieved.

The Danville police are anxious to locate Charles Sutton, alias Charles Wray. He left Danville with a 17-year old girl and the pair are believed to be located in Bradford county.

The Sayre school teachers who went out of town to spend the holiday vacation are returning home and will be ready to again take up their duties on Monday next, when the schools will resume business.

Governor Pennypacker has approved a concurrent resolution authorizing the expenditure of \$10,000 for the inauguration of Governor-elect Stuart. The inaugural ceremonies will occur on the 10th of the present month.

S. J. Mahood of St. Louis, Mo., traveling representative of the O. R. T., who has been spending some time visiting friends in this section, left this morning for New York city where he will spend a few days with relatives.

The spreading of the rails caused engine No. 76, drawing an eastbound Lehigh Valley train to jump the track near Dushore last night. One set of drivers left the rails and considerable time was consumed in retracking the engine.

In a few days the grading for the new Lehigh Valley tracks on the east side of the river at Towanda will be completed. The steam shovel has finished removing the dirt and the entire work of altering the tracks and erecting the new bridge is well under way.

The typhoid fever situation at Scranton remains unchanged, with the exception that there is a slight increase in the number of new cases reported each day. Dr. Dixon of the state board of health, asserts that the water supply is responsible for the epidemic.

Tuesday night Henry Walper, a Lehigh brakeman, fell from a freight car on a sustained while he supposed to have been slight injuries. He was removed to the State hospital, and did not show signs of serious injury until yesterday, when both sides of his body from the neck down became paralyzed. His condition is serious and it is believed he will lose his life.

Green grass growing on the lawns in Sayre on the 4th day of January is rather unusual, but such is the case on this 4th day of January, A. D. 1907. For several days past grass has been peeping out of the ground and out in the country it is said to be almost as green as in June. Farmers say that the present weather will kill the hay crop and that fruit, winter wheat and rye will also suffer from the lack of snow.

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LAW TO CHECK MINE SWINDLERS

Bill To Be Introduced in Pennsylvania Legislature to Protect Unsuspecting Victims.

An act will be introduced at the coming session of the Pennsylvania legislature which will be of interest and concern to all holders of mining stocks.

It is asserted by the father of the bill, who will work strenuously for its passage, that in nearly every section of this state there has been a lot of mining stock sold that is not worth the paper on which it is printed.

These stocks have been sold at such low figures, usually five and ten cents per share, that when the purchasers find that they have been swindled they hesitate to prosecute under existing laws, which provide punishment for those who obtain money under false pretenses.

Under the proposed law any persons who advertise or in any other way circulate false or misleading statements concerning the mines on which the stock is issued, or tell any untruths in connection with their efforts to find purchasers for their stock, will be guilty of fraud, and liable to be punished by a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or imprisonment not exceeding ten years, or both, at the discretion of the court.

The victims of worthless mining stocks in very many cases are poor people who are caught by the offers to become "mine owners" at an expense of five or ten cents per share. The inducement being held out that stock will be worth much more in a very short time. In the big majority of cases the purchasers wake up to find that the certificates which they possess is not worth a penny and that they have been victimized by sharpers.

A bill similar to the one which will be presented to the Pennsylvania legislature is also to be introduced in every state in the union, and the chances are excellent for the law becoming general.
