**BURGLARS ENTER CLOTHING STORE.**

Took a New Suit, But Left an Old One in Its Place—Also Showed a Likening For Jewelry.

Waverly—Some time last night the store of B. Freedman was burglarized. The criminals gained admission by the back entrance. It was an easy matter for the door was insecurely fastened, and it was but the work of a moment to get in.

There is a small porch or landing at the rear of the store, and it is about seven feet above the ground. A door opens upon this landing and it was here that the entry was made. The doors are double ones, and have iron hooks on the inside in which a bar can be placed for the purpose of fastening. There was a stick about an inch wide and less than an inch thick that had been placed there to secure the door. The doors were pried apart with a small iron bar, that was found on the inside this morning and the stick broken. There is another door inside of that but it was not fastened in any way, and after getting through the first barrier it was no trouble at all.

Once inside they proceeded to select such apparel as they desired, and one suit of clothes was found in the building this morning. After clothing themselves they proceeded to select such jewelry as they liked from the stock in the store, and then departed.

The vest to the suit that was left in the store had considerable paint on it. Mr. Freedman does not leave a light burning in the store at night, so a passerby could not see any one in the store, and just when the crime was committed it was not known.

**FUNERAL TOOK PLACE THIS AFTERNOON.**

Business Places Closed During the Hour of the Service.

Waverly—The funeral of Hugh J. Baldwin took place this afternoon from his late home on Pennsylvania avenue, and was largely attended by his old friends who had come from far and near. The G. A. Declare the Seat of John Quick Vacant—Order Walks Repaired—Pay Bills.

South Waverly—The regular monthly meeting of the South Waverly borough council was held at the town hall last evening.

Called to order at 7:30, President George Stevens presiding. Members present were George Stevens, John Walsh, Lewis Sincebaugh, Morrill McCraney and Harry Gates.

The seat of John Quick who has left the borough was declared vacant. The electric light and power company was ordered to repair the walk in front of its property on the north side of Bradford street within five days.

The clerk was directed to present a bill to Supt. W. E. Case for \$27.25 for drawing the franchise for the South Waverly electric line, and also a bill for \$8.40 for publishing the same.

The following bills were ordered paid: Police \$25.00; M. C. McCraney, streets, 90; A. Comstock, streets, 75 cents; G. W. Edminister, streets and postage, \$1.55.

**TREE FALLS ON MAN BREAKS HIS NECK.**

Young Italian Killed This Morning in Narrows West of Waverly.

Waverly—An Italian named Giovanni Giardi was killed this morning in the narrows west of Waverly by having a tree fall on him. His neck was broken and he was killed instantly.

He was an employe of the Powers Mansfield Co., that is laying the new trolley line between this place and Elmira. A number of trees interfered with the stringing of the necessary wires and a gang of men was engaged in digging them out. This particular tree had become loosened and fell. Giardi was under it at the time and it fell upon him with fatal results.

The remains were placed in the caboose of the work train, that is used by the company in that vicinity and brought to Waverly. Dr. Harnden was called, and found that the man's neck had been broken. The accident occurred just over the Chemung county line, and it was necessary to call a coroner from that county before anything could be done toward the disposal of the body, which had been placed in Hanford's undertaking rooms.

Deceased was only about 25 years of age, and was of athletic build. He had worked here for about ten days. He has a sister in New York city.

**EXTRACT OF**

**THE TEXT OF THE PURE FOOD LAW**

"Section 9. That no dealer shall be prosecuted under the provisions of this Act when he can establish a guaranty signed by the wholesaler, jobber, manufacturer or other party residing in the United States, from whom he purchases such articles, to the effect that the same is not adulterated or misbranded within the meaning of this Act, designating it. Said guaranty, to afford protection, shall contain the name and address of the party or parties making the sale of such articles to such dealer, and in such case said party or parties shall be amenable to the prosecutions, fines, and other penalties which would attach, in due course, to the dealer under the provisions of this Act."
