STATE RAID ON BALLOT BOXES.

Athens General Jackson Seizes Evidence in Election Controversy.
NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—All the ballot boxes containing the ballots cast in the majority election of Nov. 7, 1905, have been seized as evidence by Attorney General Jackson and are under armed guard.

A deputy sheriff will keep watch day and night at each of the places where the ballots are stored from now until the action brought by the attorney general to oust Mayor McClellan is decided by the courts.

Seizure of the ballot boxes was accomplished by virtue of an order signed by Supreme Court Justice Peter A. Hendrick, one of Charles F. Murphy's closest friends. The order recited that the attorney general had the right to take charge of the boxes, inasmuch as they contained the evidence upon which the ouster proceedings are based.

Deputy Attorney General Rathbone and a staff of assistants started out at midnight with the orders, and their methods were sensational enough. To get at the Staten Island ballot boxes, for instance, they tried to force their way into the vaults of the Staten Island Savings bank at Stapleton, where they were stored, at 2 o'clock in the morning and finally succeeded in gaining access at daylight.

The attorney general also seized the ballot boxes stored in the Manhattan Storage warehouse at Fifty-second street and Seventh avenue, the Eagle Storage warehouse in Fulton street, Brooklyn, and the Globe Storage warehouse in Long Island City.

It was understood that the ballot boxes in other boroughs would be similarly seized and resented to prevent tampering before they are taken into court to be re-counted and the ballots recounted.

Wanted to Lynch Five Negroes.
LYNCHBURG, Va., Jan. 9.—A mob of seventy-five men here tried ineffectually to take from the authorities five negro suspects under arrest in connection with the outrage by a negro of Gladys Shelton, seventeen years old, daughter of a well to do farmer, near Monroe, Va. The girl was alone at home, and the negro after accomplishing his purpose took the girl to a creek to drown her. He changed his mind and made her go to a neighbor's home while he went in another direction. Five negroes were arrested and brought here, and seventy-five men chased Sheriff Heard and a deputy for two miles. The girl is expected to recover.

Thirty Mexican Rioters Shot.
CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 9.—Reports from the mill districts of Orizaba, state of Vera Cruz, where rioting has attended the strike of the textile workers, indicate that the government troops are now complete masters of the situation. To gain control of the rioters, however, it was necessary for the troops to fire upon the men. Thirty dead are reported, while over eighty are reported wounded. It is believed that the strike has been broken.
