CORBETT NOT IN IT
Tommy Murphy Gives Denver Boy Severe Mauling.
BLOWS ON JAW STOPPED HIS TALK
Six Round Bout Before National Athletic Club at Philadelphia Ends in Sweeping Victory For New York Pugilist.
PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10.—Tommy Murphy of New York gave Young Corbett of Denver a severe beating in a six round bout before the National Athletic club here last night.
From the first to the sixth round Murphy outfigured the former champion at all stages. In the second round only the sound of the bell saved Corbett from a knockout. Murphy simply rained blows on the former Denver fighter and near the close of the round sent Corbett to the floor with a right to the jaw.
When Corbett rose Murphy kept after him, sending lefts and rights to the face and body. When the gong sounded Corbett was hanging on the ropes in practically a helpless condition. The one minute rest brought him back in fairly good condition, but Murphy gave him no opportunity to rest and drove Corbett from one side of the ring to the other, landing on the face and body almost at will.
Corbett got in an occasional blow to the kidneys and neck, but they lacked force. In the third round Corbett tried the tactics he worked on McGovern so successfully in their two championship battles. He began to hurl epithets at the New Yorker, which were intended to "rattle" Murphy. The latter simply smiled and drove two rights to the jaw with such force that Corbett forgot to talk.
The fourth, fifth and sixth rounds were repetitions of the third. Corbett tried perceptibly in the closing rounds and was simply a mark for the younger and better conditioned fighter. Murphy's condition was perfect, but it is probable that Corbett would have tipped the beam close to 140 pounds. He was slow and wild and outclassed in boxing, hitting and ring generalship.

Why Our Soldiers Desert.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The army canteen was the subject of controversy in the house while the army appropriation bill was under consideration. It had been asserted that there were more desertions during the past year than usual, and some one asked what the reason was. "The abolishment of the canteen," exclaimed Representative Kahn of California. "That is why the army is falling off. Now that the canteen has been abolished the men of the line are frequenting low grogeries and dives, and when the time comes for them to return to their posts they are unable to do so. They are under the influence of the vile liquor sold in these booze joints and are incapable of performing the duties of a soldier, and so they desert."

Not a Word on Japs in Schools.
SACRAMENTO, CAL., Jan. 10.—James N. Gillette was inaugurated governor, and the legislature assembled in joint session. In his address the governor requested the passage of a pure food law, visited the consideration of a direct primary law and suggested amendments to the state insurance laws, affording better protection to policy holders, and recommending a consideration of the laws of New York and Massachusetts on this subject.

Bridge Carries Down Six Men.
CUMBERLAND, MD., Jan. 10.—A highway bridge over Wills creek here collapsed while being rebuilt, carrying down six men, including Frank Ward, of New York, superintendent of the gang. Edward Norwood of Cumberland, one of the workmen, revived, probably fatal injuries. Another workman was caught under a heavy timber and narrowly escaped drowning. The men were precipitated thirty feet to the swollen waters of the creek.

New Shah to Be Enthroned Feb. 2.
TEHERAN, Jan. 10.—The enthronement of the new shah, Mohammed Ali-Mirza, has been fixed for the 2nd of February, the festival of the lake, which will be celebrated on Feb. 2. The selection of this date is regarded as very suspicious, it being the anniversary of the day upon which the prophet, standing at the side of the lake, proclaimed that Mohammed Ali-Mirza was his own flesh and blood.
