BOARD OF HEALTH PASSED RESOLUTION

Recommend to the State Commission That the Cutting of Ice Be Allowed Only Under Rigid Inspection.

Waverly—The board of health of the town of Barton met last night for the purpose of considering the evidence obtained in the investigation that it has been conducting with reference to the manner in which the ice is harvested from the reservoir from which the village draws its supply. After a somewhat lengthy discussion of the matter it was decided to submit the following resolution to the state health commissioner: "That President Harding be instructed to inform commissioner Porter that it is the opinion of the board that ice should not be harvested on the reservoir of the Waverly Water Works Co. unless the town board of health of the town of Barton, N. Y., be given the power to employ such inspectors as they deem necessary at a suitable compensation, to see that the strictest sanitary rules are carried out in the cutting of said ice; such rules and regulations to be posted in a conspicuous place near the pond, and such rules and regulations to be made by the state board of health.

N. P. L. DECLARES USUAL DIVIDEND.

The Executive Board Has Decided That the Dividend for the Year Remain at \$250,000.

Waverly—The executive board of the N. P. L. is still in session this afternoon, but it has been announced that the members of the board have decided that the dividend shall remain the same this year as it has been heretofore, namely \$250,000.

READY TO DROP TWO-CENT FARE.

Machine in Training to Break Its Pledge to People.

A story that cannot be traced to any definite source is to the effect that the two-cent passenger rate on steam railways, which all parties pledged themselves to legislate in favor of, will not get the consideration expected. Already there is talk of the Machine going back on its pledges. It is argued that a two-cent rate will operate against those who work in cities and reside in the country, and who now get a special ticket at less than a two-cent rate.

WEDDINGS IN BINGHAMTON.

Some Interesting Statements About the Pennsylvanians Who Get Married in That City.

The year of 1906 brought forth a new record in the number of couples married by a Binghamton minister and as the record of former years was held by the Rev. Joan Phillips of the First Baptist church, so the record of last year was made by him. The number was 229 couples married by Dr. Phillips. Of the couples married by Dr. Phillips last year about two-thirds came from Pennsylvania. The marrying business is an important one with Dr. Phillips, for while a man pays whatever he desires, the usual fee is \$5. The biggest fee ever paid to him by a Pennsylvania couple was \$15. Sometimes it is \$2 and occasionally but \$1.

EXTRACT OF THE TEXT OF THE PURE FOOD LAW

"Section 9. That no dealer shall be prosecuted under the provisions of this Act when he can establish a guaranty signed by the wholesaler, jobber, manufacturer or other party residing in the United States, from whom he purchases such articles, to the effect that the same is not adulterated or misbranded within the meaning of this Act, designating it. Said guaranty, to afford protection, shall contain the name and address of the party or parties making the sale of such articles to such dealer, and in such case said party or parties shall be amenable to the prosecutions, fines, and other penalties which would attach, in due course, to the dealer under the provisions of this Act."
