JEWELER HAS LARGE COLLECTION OF COINS.

Simon Zausmer's Holdings of Old Coin Number Over \$1,000—Are Both Foreign and Domestic.

Waverly—Simon Zausmer, the jeweler, has a collection of coins that seems to put in the shade anything in this section. It includes both domestic and foreign coins, and there are something over a thousand of them in the collection. Nearly every coin that has been minted at any time by this government is included in the list.

He has several gold pieces, the most interesting of which are two tiny quarter dollar pieces made from California gold, and bearing the inscription "Cal. Gold."

There are a large number of Polish coins in the collection. One of them dates back as far as 1582, and they run up to the last of the 18th century.

A Bavarian coin dated 1764 bears the inscription of the Virgin Mary. A Spanish silver piece is dated 1680, and there is a coin issued by the Vatican during the time of Pope Pius IX.

A number of Chinese pieces, with the square hole in the center also number among them.

A penny dated 1783 has the lettering "Washington and Independents" on the face of it, while a coin of 1864, bears the motto, "Lincoln and Union."

There are also about 300 small silver pieces of the United States that are no longer coined.

WILL GIVE LAND TO VILLAGE FOR PURPOSE OF PARK.

L. P. Shepard Announces That He Will Make a Present to the Village of the Small Grove on Pine Street.
