W. W. ASTOR TO WED

Bride to Be Countess of Westmoreland When Divorced.

GIFTS OF JEWELS AND MOTOR CAR

London Reports Engagement of Titled Woman to American Millionaire Before Separation From Her Lawful Lord.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The reported intention of William Waldorf Astor, the millionaire American of English proclivities, who renounced his allegiance to the United States and has dwelt in London since 1899, to marry the beautiful Countess of Westmoreland as soon as she obtains a divorce from Lord Westmoreland is reiterated in the British capital.

Although it is understood that the earl will consent to his wife becoming the bride of the expatriated American, still there is no hint of scandal, and it is asserted that the details of the separation have already been arranged.

While the earl and his wife had been estranged for several years, they had kept up an appearance of friendliness for the sake of their two children. But an incident of last summer completed the rupture and hastened the arrangements for her marriage to Mr. Astor.

The earl was white with wrath, for every one in society was well aware he could not afford to buy such expensive ornaments for his wife, and there were immediate inquiries and speculation as to where the jewels came from.

It was soon whispered that Mr. Astor was the donor of the gift and that it was but the precursor of a formal separation between the earl and the countess and the marriage of Mr. Astor and the countess.

Another incident that set tongues wagging was the receipt by the countess at Christmas of a magnificent automobile, in which she now makes her calls. The furs she wears are at once the envy and the despair of all the women in London.

This is not the first time that Mr. Astor, who has been a widower for several years, has been coupled in a matrimonial report with the name of a titled English woman, but this seems to be the first time that the report has such an excellent foundation of truth.

One result of his marriage to the countess would make Mr. Astor a brother-in-law of Anna Robinson, formerly a chorus girl on the stage in this city, who is the wife of the Earl of Rosslyn, a brother of the Countess of Westmoreland, who, under the name of John Erskine, filled an engagement as an actor in this city a few years ago.

The Countess of Westmoreland, who married the earl in 1802, is a sister of the Countess of Warwick, the Duchess of Sutherland and Lady Angela Forbes. She is brilliant, a splendid housewife and rather advanced in her ideas.

Lord Westmoreland has a notable ancestry, but he is without money, the combined incomes of himself and wife amounting to but \$12,000 a year. He was compelled to sell his ancestral estate to get money to live on.

William Waldorf Astor was born in New York in 1848. He is the eldest son of John Jacob Astor 2d and a great-grandson of the founder of the Astor family on that side of the Atlantic.

Don't Want Ice From "Open Sewer." NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The Merchants' association, through Edward Hatch, Jr., chairman of the committee "on the pollution of the waters of New York state," has called upon Dr. Eugene H. Porter, state commissioner of health, to institute an immediate surveillance of the Hudson river ice fields, from which this city secures the greater part of its ice supply.

Insane Frenchman Arrested. MANCHESTER, N. Elkins Renominated For Senate. CHARLESTON, W. Va., Jan. 15.—Stephen B. Elkins has received the Republican caucus nomination for his third successive term as United States senator. Mr. Elkins' nomination is equivalent to election, as the Republicans have 34 to 29 votes on joint ballot.

Famous Maidener Gored. CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 15.—Antonio Montes, one of the foremost matadors of Spain, was fatally gored by a bull in a fight here. Montes was about to place the sword when the bull caught him. Doctors say he cannot survive.

Bishop Montgomery Barred. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 15.—The funeral of the late Archbishop George Montgomery was held at St. Mary's cathedral. The body was placed in a vault in Holy Cross cemetery.

Midget Suffocated by Gas. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Jan. 15.—Richard Donan, a midget, who formerly traveled extensively with theatrical companies, was accidentally suffocated by illuminating gas here. He was found sitting in a chair, with gas escaping through a hose which led from a fixture on the wall to a heater. It is supposed that he accidentally loosened the hose in his sleep.

Fog Caused Wreck on Wabash. CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—Seven persons were injured, several seriously, when an outbound train on the Mazon railroad collided in a fog with a sleeper on the rear end of a Wabash train at One Hundred and Twelfth street at midnight. The accident was caused by the inability of the trainmen to discern signals in the dense fog.

Y. M. C. A. Branch In Canal Zone. NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Sailing on the steamer Panama for Colon was A. B. Minear of the Washington branch of the Young Men's Christian association. Mr. Minear is going to the isthmus to study the social conditions surrounding the employees on the canal work and also to start a Y. M. C. A. branch for the canal employees.
