NUMBER OF BOYS ACCUSED OF ILLEGAL TRAIN RIDING.

Claimed That a Party of 13 Took a Trip at the Expense of the Railroad.

Waverly—A crowd of boys 13 in number have been accused of illegal train riding, and will appear before Justice Hoagland this afternoon for the disposition of their cases. It is stated that boys raised Cain generally along the line of the railroad some time ago, and the railroad is making an effort to stop a practice that is much more dangerous to the boys who persist in it than it is damaging to the company.

WILL PREVENT TAX DODGING

Hon. Byram L. Winters Would Stop Speculation in Cemetery Lots by Imposing Taxes.

Waverly—That Assemblyman Byram L. Winters is not idle in part evidenced by the fact that he has introduced a bill that is designed to bring in considerable sums of money to those communities in which cemeteries are located, and prevent speculation in cemetery lots. At present cemetery lots are free from taxation, and it has been the custom of land speculators to purchase a large number of lots in cemeteries near growing cities, and to hold them until they are needed for municipal purposes, when they are sold at a large profit. They have been free from taxes all this time, and consequently held without expense to the owner until he can sell at a large profit. It has been found on investigation that in some cases as many as 6,000 cemetery lots have been held by one person.

"The bill provides that one individual shall not hold over four lots aggregating one fourth acre in extent that shall be free from taxation. The proposed bill is as follows: "The cemetery lands and property of any association formed pursuant to this act and any property held in trust by it shall be exempt from all public taxes, rates and assessments and shall not be liable to be sold on executions or to be applied in payment of debts due from any individual proprietor, except the proprietor of lots in such cemeteries, their heirs or devisees may not hold more than four lots aggregating not more than one-quarter of an acre in area exempt from taxation so long as the same shall remain dedicated to the purposes of a cemetery and during that time no street, road, avenue or thoroughfare shall be laid out through lots in which dead bodies have been interred in such cemetery without the consent of the trustees of such association except by special permission of the Legislature of the state.

WILL PREVENT TAX DODGING

CITY OF ITHACA ALSO HAS TROLLEY PROJECTS IN VIEW.

Six of Them in Contemplation But None Building.

Waverly—Ithaca seems to have even more trolley projects up for consideration at one time than does Waverly. At least the following editorial in the Ithaca Journal would seem to indicate that such is the case: "Yet another interurban trolley project for Ithaca. This time to Corning via Waverly. These trolley roads on paper are pleasant to contemplate. It would be greater joy to actually hear the clanging of the car gongs, and read the names of the road upon the real cars actually moving. Of six proposals at least one should be constructed." Waverly is ahead of this however, for it has at least one road in course of construction.

PRICES WILL GO UP.

Pure Food Law Enforcement May Prove Very Costly Experiment to Public.

"The enforcement of the pure food law will touch the public much more nearly than it can effect us," declared a prominent wholesale grocer yesterday. "I am a little afraid that the public will have occasion to regret the fact that they so strenuously insisted on getting absolutely pure food products, for it is as certain as that the sun shines, that many manufacturers will take advantage of the changed conditions and run the price of their goods up to outrageous amounts, claiming that if they give the public pure goods, the public must pay the extra cost of manufacture."

It is claimed by men who have given the subject careful thought that this grocer's forecast is remarkably keen and well founded. It is claimed that the rage for pure foods has given unscrupulous men a chance to sell cheap articles as absolutely pure and unadulterated, and charge two or three times what they should. The enforcement of the law will not begin until next October, for the department officials have granted manufacturers and wholesalers that much time in which to dispose of the present stocks on hand, which would otherwise be almost a dead loss in many cases.
