KINGSTON IN RUINS

Earthquake Wrecks Jamaica's Beautiful Capital.
ALL DIRECT REPORTS CUT OFF
As at San Francisco, City Was Soon Ablaze.

DEATH LIST PUT AT ONE HUNDRED

Disaster Came Without Warning on Monday, Causing Ruin, Death and Panic to British Island Colony in Caribbean Sea—Land and Telegraph Lines Being Down Prevented the News From Reaching the Outside World Until the Present Time—Sir James Ferguson and English Tourists Suffer, the Baronet Being Instantly Killed—Forty Soldiers Dead in Hospital.

FORT ANTONIO, Jamaica, Jan. 16.—Kingston, the picturesque capital of the island of Jamaica, has been devastated by a violent earthquake, and all direct communication with the stricken city has been cut off.

The land and telegraph lines which had been thrown down have been reconstructed to within five miles of Kingston, and from meager reports received through these channels, it has been learned that many of the most important buildings have been destroyed and that there has been serious loss of life.

Kingston has been ruined by the earthquake, and a very great number of buildings and dwellings were destroyed either by the earthquake or by the consequent fire.

The flames apparently have been mainly confined to the docks and the warehouse district. If this is so only a small portion of the city has been burned over.

The cable office at Holland bay was badly damaged, and all the land lines to Kingston were instantly interrupted, but communication here by the land lines has been restored. Almost everybody in Kingston is camping out in open fields, and much distress prevails.

The Jamaica-Cuba and the Jamaica-Bermuda cables are interrupted.

The Right Hon. Sir James Ferguson, mentioned in the foregoing dispatch, was a man of considerable prominence. He served in the Crimean campaign with the Grenadier guards and was present at the battles of Alma and Inkerman, where he was wounded, and the siege of Sevastopol.

E. J. RUSSELL ESCAPES

Insane Man Who Tried to Prove His Sanity in Supreme Court Is Free.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—It is reported from Pottsville, N. Y., that Edward J. Russell, the insane convict, escaped from a train between Albany and that city.

Russell conducted his own case before Justice Traux in the supreme court in this city, showing a knowledge of law and of logical sequences in his cross examinations that astonished his hearers.

Russell asserted in court that he gave President Roosevelt and Charles F. Murphy information which caused Odell's political downfall.

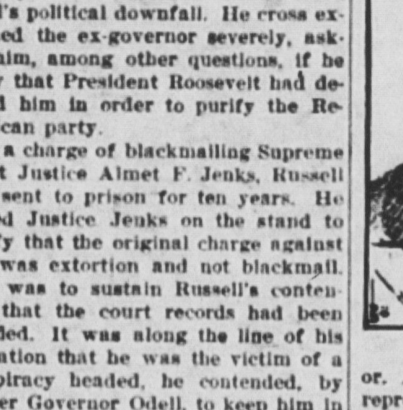
