This feeling ran so high that after a time every union man was called upon to show his colors, and the stars and stripes were floated upon nearly every house in the land. Mr. McKinney had one on his house in Litchfield and soon there came a report that a delegation was coming to tear down his flag. Just then John A. Dix issued his famous order: "If any one attempts to haul down the American flag shoot him on the spot." Mr. McKinney saw the delegation coming and planting himself in the door of his house with a gun he waited results. They came but seeing the look of determination in McKinney's eye they went away without the flag, and it was not disturbed.

FIELD DAY AND TRACK MEETING
Will Be Held at Athens, Pa., May 18, 1907—Fine Program Arranged.
Following is the report of the meeting of the executive committee of Bradford county I. A. A. held Jan. 19, 1907. The first field and track meet shall be held at Athens, Pa., May 18, 1907. The program will begin at 1:45 p. m. The events and order in which they will be held, are as follows: 1—Hundred yard dash; 2—Mile run; 3—High jump; 4—400 yard run; 5—Running broad jump; 6—220 yard low hurdle, trials; 7—Two mile run; 8—Pole vault; 9—Low hurdle final; 10—Hammer throw; 11—One half mile run; 12—Shot put; 13—220 yard run.
The officials shall be one man to act as both starter and referee and three men to act as judges, who shall not be interested in any of the schools or students participating; one clerk of course with assistants, one man to act as announcer and scorer who may be local parties. Individual prizes shall be, 1—a prize of blue ribbon words printed thereon designating that holder has won a first place; 2—a similar piece of orange ribbon and 3—a similar piece of red ribbon.
The trophy to be decided upon later, for the school winning the largest number of points shall be the property of the association, but held by the winning school until the next annual meet when it shall be returned to the executive committee. Providing, that any school winning first place for three years in succession, shall be presented with the trophy and a new one shall be provided by the association to be competed for by the schools.
Each team may have one representative who will be allowed on the course to look after the interests of the team. All others except contestants and officials wearing badges shall be excluded from the course.
Rule 15 of the Laws of Athletics of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association shall be changed so as to allow the starter to fire a second shot to recall the contestants for improper starting.
To meet the necessary expenses of the association an admission fee of 25 cents shall be charged to all except officials and press representatives provided with passes. Providing, the amount of admission to all actual contestants in events shall be refunded to their respective schools. Ten cents each for men and boys shall be charged for seats in the grand stand.
Other regulations shall be provided for in the constitution of the association and in the rules of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association, No. 269. These rules may be obtained for ten cents a copy of A. G. Spalding and Brothers, New York.
