SLAUGHTER AT GRODNO.

Twelve Killed in Fight Between Terrorists, Police and Troops. GRODNO, Russia, Jan. 20.—As a result of a general exchange of shots between the authorities and a number of terrorists on the streets of Grodno five policemen, a prison warden and one terrorist were killed and a number of persons were wounded.

The trouble started when two men, without warning, shot and killed a prison warden. The assailants fled, one of them taking refuge in a church and the other in a private house. They were pursued by the police, and three policemen, who had effected the arrest of the man in the church, were attacked by the assembled crowd, fired upon and killed. The terrorist escaped.

The police then proceeded to the house where the second man had hid den, and as they approached the building he opened fire and killed two of his pursuers. At this stage of the fighting troops were called out and fired a volley, killing the man who had hidden in the house and wounding several passers-by.

At Loda, Russian Poland, a band of terrorists shot and killed a policeman and two soldiers who were accompanying him on the streets. A patrol at once retaliated by firing a volley down the street. Two passers-by were killed and several were wounded. The murderers escaped.

TRADE CONDITIONS.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Business Report.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: Low temperature and snow at many points stimulated retail demand for reasonable merchandise, but retarded movement of freight, which was beginning to show noteworthy improvement. Distribution of heavyweight clothing, footwear and other winter goods was very large. Wholesale and jobbing trade in dry goods for spring delivery was also liberal. Leading manufacturing industries report a steady volume of new business. Railway earnings thus far reported for January were 13.5 per cent larger than a year ago. Commercial failures for the week in the United States were 298 against 262 last week, 311 the preceding week and 334 the corresponding week last year.

A gratifying steadiness is noted in the iron and steel industry, mills receiving a volume of new business that really sustains prices, yet there is little evidence of abnormal activity or speculative inflation of quotations. Attendance of shoe jobbers in the Boston market has decreased, and in another week the balance will probably conclude purchases.

Fast Line From St. John's to Ireland.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Jan. 23.—English capitalists have closed a contract with the government of Newfoundland for a fast transatlantic steamship line to run between a port on the Irish coast and St. John's. The steamers are to make twenty-two knots an hour.
