LOCAL BREVITIES

"The Volunteer Organist" at the Loomis opera house this evening.

The new primary law which was tried for the first time on Saturday appears to have given general satisfaction.

The mercury took another downward plunge on Saturday night and yesterday morning thermometers registered anywhere from 12 to 20 degrees below zero.

All fears of an ice famine have been dispelled. The weather of the past 48 hours has formed ice rapidly and all dealers are busily engaged in harvesting a large supply.

Mayor Dimmick of Scranton, has issued orders to the police department to order all saloonkeepers to close back rooms where women are served with liquor and also given notice that the order must be strictly enforced.

There are more than the usual number of railway casualties at the present time. Some are inclined to believe that the number is not greater but that more of them are reported in the public press.

A number of the young friends of Madeline O'Connor, gathered at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. J. O'Connor of Stevenson street, on Saturday evening, to tender her a surprise, the occasion being her twelfth birthday. A most pleasant evening was spent and Miss Madeline was the recipient of many handsome presents. Refreshments were served.

The typhoid epidemic at Scranton is waning and it is believed that the scourge is now under control. The total number of cases is between 1,000 and 1,100, and the total deaths less than 100. The state authorities took control of the situation and in connection with the city officials are enforcing strict sanitary regulations. An unusual number of diphtheria and scarlet fever cases has created an alarm lest they become epidemic also.

MINISTERS BEGIN MEETING TONIGHT

Rev. F. W. Hannan Will Address Ministerial Association in M. E. Church This Evening.

The Ministerial Association of the Owego District, Wyoming Conference, will begin the mid-winter session in the Methodist church at this place this evening. The opening session will occur at 7:30 o'clock and the address will be made by Rev. F. W. Hannan, D. D., of Brooklyn, N. Y. He has chosen for his subject, "The Heart of the Evangelist," and as he is a fine pulpit orator a large crowd will be in attendance.

The meeting of the association promises to be a most successful one as there are an unusually large number of ministers in attendance. Three sessions will be held tomorrow beginning at 9 o'clock in the morning.

LOCAL BREVITIES

FILTERED WATER IS FREE FROM TYPHOID.

Report for January Shows Water Company's Product to Be in Excellent Condition.

The Sayre Water company have received a report from Dr. Mazyck P. Ravenel, Bacteriologist, Philadelphia, giving results of his examination of samples of water collected by his assistant January 20th at Sayre.

A number of injurious bacteria were found in the raw river water, but all samples of filtered water were of good quality and absolutely free from typhoid or other objectionable bacteria.

It would seem advisable, in view of Dr. Ravenel's report, to refrain from drinking either raw river water or well water in this locality, unless properly filtered or boiled, and also be careful in the use of ice cut on the river or any pond liable to contamination from drainage.

BOROUGH COUNCIL MEETING TONIGHT.

The Sewer Proposition Will Again Be on the Carpet.

There will be a special meeting of the borough council this evening in the Packer hose rooms, at which time the sewer question will again come up for discussion, and there is a strong probability that the matter will be finally disposed of. The contracts with the Lehigh Valley, which on the part of the latter allow the sewer to pass under their tracks, have been signed and unless there are new objections to the proposition there seems to be nothing in the way of a final settlement of the matter.

"The Volunteer Organist."

GROUND HOG DAY SATURDAY NEXT.

If the Little Animal Sees His Shadow He Will Return to His Hole for a Period of Six Weeks.

Next Saturday, February 2, is "ground hog day," and according to ancient traditions if the little animal who has been hibernating since winter began comes out of his hole and sees his shadow, he will immediately return to his winter quarters and remain there for a period of six weeks. During this time, according to the belief in the "ground hog" story, the weather will be exceedingly cold; there will be blizzards galore and the coal men will reap a harvest. On the other hand, however, should the ground hog come out of his hole, and after looking searchingly about fails to find his shadow, then he will venture forth again, as this proves to him that the weather will be mild and agreeable.

The "ground hog" idea is as old as the hills and has been handed down from generation to generation for many years. There are those who have implicit confidence in the story, and if the sun shines on the 2d day of February, they will tell you that the ensuing six weeks will be marked by severely cold weather. Others, however, laugh at the idea and place it in the same category with other superstitions that have been proven fallacies.

P. R. L. RAISES AGE LIMIT.

Man of 45 Can Now Get Employment With the Company.

Any competent man up to 45 years of age can now obtain employment with the Pennsylvania Railroad Co., providing, of course, there are any vacancies, a thing that has never been possible before.

Since the organization of the company 35 years has been the age limit at which one might enter the service. The regulations have been changed. The new move opens the way for men on other lines who have gained reputations for carefulness, which is only made possible by long experience, to obtain positions on the Pennsylvania.

The raising of the age limit will necessitate some changes in the pension rules, the details of which will be worked out as soon as possible.
