Athens—There was quite a flurry about the fourth ward election Saturday on account of the change in voting place that was made necessary. **Crackman Caught at Ridgewood.**  
RIDGEWOOD, N. J., Jan. 28.—Frederick Webber, who says his home is in New York and who claims to belong to a respectable family, was caught in the house of J. V. L. Wyckoff early in the morning. There were two burglars in the house, and one, who escaped, aroused Mr. Wyckoff, who covered Webber with his revolver. He surrendered and is in jail. He denied ever having been in this section before, but a ring was found on him which was identified as having been stolen by burglars from the residence of William Raymond in Ridgewood on Jan. 6.

**Hudson Courthouse Burned.**  
HUDSON, N. Y., Jan. 28.—The Columbia county courthouse here has been burned, with a loss of about \$200,000. The building, which was erected in 1900, was a three story structure of white marble and, in addition to all the county offices, contained the office of Justice Cochrane of the appellate division of the supreme court. Mrs. Charles Walker and her young son were surrounded by the flames on the third floor of the building. Mrs. Walker dropped the boy from a window and was herself rescued by firemen. The origin of the fire is in doubt.

**Meyer Says Goodbye to the Czar.**  
ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 28.—Ambassador Meyer was received by the emperor in special audience and presented letters of recall. Secretary Bliss assumed the direction of the American embassy as charge d'affaires and interim. At the conclusion of the audience, which lasted half an hour and was marked by great cordiality, the emperor, Mr. Meyer's services as ambassador having terminated with the presentation of his letters of recall, personally conferred on him the grand cordon of the Alexander Nevski order.

**Despondency Caused Double Suicide.**  
DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 28.—Thomas Thompson, aged fifty years, a laborer, and his wife were found dead in their lodgings here on Champlain street with an empty strychnine bottle and two glasses close by. The couple came from England three years ago, and Mrs. Thompson is said to have contracted the liquor habit since her arrival in this country. Despondency over the woman's inability to reform is thought to have impelled them to commit suicide.

**Boat Sunk by Ice.**  
VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Jan. 28.—The steam water boat Mayta of this port was sunk at her moorings by the ice during the night.


