**FREIGHT WRECK NEAR SPENCER**

Both Tracks Were Blocked and No. 6 Was Compelled to Go Over the New Road.

A freight wreck on the Lehigh Valley at Spencer last night blocked both tracks and passenger train No. 6 was compelled to reach Sayre over the new road. Three cars in the freight train were derailed and thrown across both tracks in such a manner that traffic was effectually blocked. The wrecking crew from this place was dispatched to the scene of the accident and succeeded in clearing the tracks at an early hour this morning. No one was injured, but the damage to the company's property was considerable. The cause of the accident is not known.

**FORMER DETECTIVE IN DURANCE VILE**

Joe Simon, Wanted in Sayre on Various Charges is Languishing in Jail at Wilkes-Barre.

Joe Simon, an Austrian, formerly employed here as a special officer for the Lehigh Valley, is in jail at Wilkes-Barre on a charge of stealing brass junk from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Simon has practically admitted his guilt and a sojourn of two years in the penitentiary is staring him in the face. In the meantime several of his Sayre creditors are wondering how they are going to get their money. Simon came to Sayre early last summer. He was accompanied by a fellow countryman and the two were instructed to watch the trains going in and out of the Sayre yards and apprehend all unlawful train riders. Several arrests were made but as there was little money in the business Simon and his fellow officer gave up the job and sought another field of labor. When they left town Simon owed John C. Osborn, proprietor of the Osborn house, a board bill amounting to about \$20. He told Osborn that he was working for the Lehigh Valley at a salary of \$75 per month, but when Osborn came to look the matter up he discovered that Simon's name was not on the pay rolls and that the man had been lying. Another citizen is out \$12, which he loaned Joe on the strength of his having money coming from the Lehigh Valley for services. Warrants were issued for the wily Austrian but he was not located until recently. He was found languishing in jail in Wilkes-Barre, on the charge stated above. He will be brought before the next grand jury in Luzerne county, and as he practically pleaded guilty to the charges, there is no doubt as to what the grand jury will do. Simon is considered to be a decidedly bad egg in and about Wilkes-Barre, and his prospects for a long term in the "pen" appears excellent at the present writing. In the meantime his Sayre creditors will pocket their loss and say nothing, until Simon has served out his sentence and then they will press their charges.

**REVIVAL MEETINGS BEGAN LAST NIGHT.**

They Will Be Continued For Four Weeks and Are in Charge of Rev. Henry F. Ketch.  
The first of series of revival meetings was held in the Church of Christ West Sayre, last night, a large congregation being present. The meetings are in charge of Evangelist Henry F. **Valley Passenger Engineer Dead.**

William Rhoades of Delano, for many years a Lehigh Valley passenger who had been employed of late as an engineer on the Reading, died at the Ashland hospital during Sunday night from appendicitis. He was admitted to the hospital on Thursday, but his case was so far gone that his life could not be saved, consequently no operation was performed. He is survived by his wife and two children and one brother, who is chief of police at Mt. Carmel.

**1,000 WANT TO WEAR GOLD LACES AS AIDS.**

Big Struggle to Get on the Military Staff of the New Governor.

Governor Stuart is just now having his own sweet time with the boys who are ambitious to display themselves and at the same time serve the state arrayed in gold and lace and military trappings.  
Already more than 1,000 young men have applied to the governor for appointments on his military staff, yet he has only twenty-three places to give out.  
Of these, ten are department officers, with the rank of colonel, and thirteen are aides-de-camp, with the rank of lieutenant colonel. One of the oldest members of the governor's staff in point of service is Colonel Sheldon Potter, of Philadelphia, who has been Chief of Ordnance for twelve years. In the recent gubernatorial contest he was for Lewis Emmery, Jr., but since the guard is supposed to be free from politics this may not count against him.  
To appear properly equipped on the staff of the governor costs not less than \$1,000 a year. The difference in rank does not reduce the cost of the trappings, as there are no privates, and the officers wear about all the lace and gaudy trimmings their clothes will carry. Then, there are swords and puttees and spurs to be provided; but the young men who are anxious to display themselves in gorgeous array are not stopped by the price. Many of them would be delighted with an appointment if the cost were ten times as much.

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**STRIKING SCENES IN SIMPLE SIMON SIMPLE.**

The Most Attractive, However, is the Pond Lily Scene in the Third Act.

There are many striking scenes to Nixon & Zimmerman's new cartoon, musical extravaganza, "Simple Simon Simple," which comes to the Loomis opera house tomorrow evening. The most attractive, however, is the Pond Lily scene in the third act. The curtain rises to weird music and a view of a dismal swamp is disclosed. Pools of water shimmering in the moonlight are to be seen in the foreground, Cat tails and rushes wave gently in the wind; the fire flies gleam in the dusk; the frogs croak and crickets chirp in heard abroad in the land, while in the distance the mist slowly rises from the boggy ground. The village choir stops at the old stone wall a moment to render a superb number, "The Echo in the Moon," and as they stroll away in the darkness, little Mose accompanied by his old mammy slide on much awed by the mystery that seems to hover over the place. The effect is at once beautiful and striking.
