SCHROEDER'S DIXIE A WONDER.

Accident at Palm Beach Motor Races Might Have Been a Fatality.

PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 31.—The feature of the events on Lake Worth, the second day of the motor boat regatta, was the sensational performance of the Dixie, owned by Commodore E. J. Schroeder of the Motor Boat Club of America.

The second event, a ten mile race for boats of thirty foot lead water line and above, was won by the Dixie, the scratch boat, in 22 minutes 8 seconds. A five mile event for boats of the same class was won by the Dixie, again scratch boat, in 11 minutes 8 seconds.

The fifteen mile event, which closed the sport, was marked by the sensational driving of the Dixie, which gave the limit boat a handicap of more than thirty minutes and yet finished second. The Dixie made the total distance in 32 minutes 51 seconds. The first five mile lap was completed in 10 minutes 50 seconds, the second lap of five miles in 10 minutes 57 seconds and the third and last lap in 10 minutes 55 seconds. This is driving at the rate of 23.5 miles per hour.

The fifteen mile event was won by the Mera of West Palm Beach.

The five mile event for boats of thirty foot lead water line and below was won by the Mera of West Palm Beach in 20 minutes 55 seconds.

The ten mile event for boats of the same class was won by the Baby Bullet of Eugalville.

At the close of the second event the Bruiser, owned by James K. Clark of Ardmore, Pa., was run into by the Katherine, owned by J. Middleby, Jr., of Boston. Both boats were sunk. Mrs. Clark was in the Bruiser at the time and only the quick action of her husband, who cut her skirts free from the boat's machinery in which they had become caught, saved the accident from ending more seriously, though the collision occurred in comparatively shallow water. Mrs. Clark was carried ashore absolutely unconscious in the Possum, owned by her father, Lieutenant H. L. Willoughby of Newport. The Gray Wolf, owned and driven by her brother, was beside her when the accident occurred. Just who was to blame for the collision has not yet been officially determined.

Ice Skating Races.

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Four thousand persons witnessed the eastern championship ice skating races at the Pontiac club. Morris Wood of the Saratoga Skating club won all his heats. In the 220 yard dash he won by twenty-five yards, and in the mile and a half race he won almost as he pleased from start to finish. In the three mile event, however, Logan of the Verona Lake Skating club pressed Wood closely.

E. M. Fry at New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 31.—E. M. Fry, a heavily played favorite, easily won the Premier stakes for two-year-olds, the feature of the Fair ground card. A heavy rainstorm broke out just as the first race was being run, almost obscuring the horses. Other winners were Guy Mansinger, Lady Navarro, Glamour, Knighton, Foreigner and Mahogany.

Handicap For Kercheval.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—There was a large attendance at the Oakland track, great interest being taken in the Tierney handicap, in which Kercheval, winner of the Burns handicap again met Nealon and again won. Dusty Miller made a grand effort but was beaten only a neck after forcing the pace, the favorite coming in third.

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
