ATHENS.

ATHENS BOROUGH COUNCIL MEETING

All Members Present With One Exception, and Important Matters Were Considered.

Athens—The Borough Council held their regular monthly meeting last night with all of the members present except Weiss. A communication was read from President E. O. Francke of the board of health reciting the fact that they funds were running low and asking for another appropriation. An order was voted to the amount of \$100.

A verbal complaint was made by citizens of the third ward stating that they were annoyed by members of No. 3 hose company who congregated at their rooms Sundays and played billiards. They state that the noise is not great but persists so closely to Sabbath desecration that it is a very great annoyance to them as they go to and from church. No action was taken.

The building committee, Messrs. Tripp, Clark and Sutton retired in secret conference to consider a request of Contractor Hummel asking for the balance of the money on his contract for the fourth ward hose house. On returning to the session Mr. Tripp explained that the terms of the contract required the contractor to complete the work and present receipts bills from every one who had furnished labor or material to the building committee before full payment could be made. Mr. Hummel stated that it was impossible for him to meet this requirement unless the council would advance the money to him. By provisions of the contract payments might be made by holding back 20 per cent of the amounts represented by work completed, the rest to be paid when all of the requirements had been met. There has already been paid \$1,890.00 and a further payment of \$900 was asked for. After some discussion it was voted to give Mr. Hummel an order for \$390, and that the balance should be withheld until all of the requirements of the contract had been complied with. A further appropriation was asked to defray the expense of an electric inspector from Scranton for examination of the lighting fixtures. An order for \$2.50 was voted for this purpose.

The street committee reported that the committee composed of Welier, Tripp and Nevins accompanied Commissioner Mulligan and Councilman Stevens had visited the place at corner of Orchard and Main streets where the accident to Mrs. VanBuskirk was claimed to have been received and that they found nothing that would warrant the charge of negligence or danger in the conditions there. The sidewalks were as perfect as they were at any place in town, and they believe that the claimants have no grounds for action against the borough.

As time for closing last year's business was near it was moved by Mr. Stevens that a committee be appointed to look over the accounts of the borough collector with the purpose of ascertaining what exonerations would be allowed and be ready to report at the next regular meeting.

On motion it was agreed to call a special meeting for next Monday evening at which time the building committee are to report on a settlement with the contractor of No. 4 hose house.

B. A. Finch, manager of a moving picture company will be in Athens and will give an exhibition of scenes in the life of Moses at the Baptist church Sunday evening, Feb 24th. On Monday evening the 25th he will give a public exhibition at the same place consisting of miscellaneous views. It will be an up-to-date exhibition.

Flagstaff, Arizona.

Editor The Valley Record.
On August 25 five of us drove to the foot of San Francisco mountain, seven miles from Flagstaff, where the ladies stopped at the sheep ranch to pick flowers and wait while we went on up the mountain. Well, the Presbyterians were to hold their picnic the same day, and the pastor remarked on the Sabbath before that the rainy season was past and we could expect a fine day on Tuesday for the picnic. So we fixed the 28th for the climb. In short, it commenced to rain just as we reached the ranch. After partaking of coffee and lunch at 11:49 we started to walk to the top of the mountain, a distance, as our guide said, of seven miles uphill, a rise of about 8,000 feet, the summit being 15,000 feet above sea level. Our guide took us a cross-cut to the trail, thru woods, grass, weeds, etc., so you may know that our "understanding was thoroughly moistened, as it continued to rain a steady drizzle. The mountain was covered with a dense mass of clouds, but we jogged our way on-wards towards the top. The guide was with us to what is called the saddle, which is a low place in the rim of the crater, which latter lies at the right hand side and extends for miles towards the sunset mountain. Here we said we could not lose the trail and he returned. Three of us—myself, son C. H. and his son 9 years of age, pressed on up. As we neared the top, the clouds broke away and with a field glass we had a good view of the crater and the mountains to the northeast. At our right from the trail and near the rim was quite a body of snow. We were so tired we did not leave the trail to visit the snow, but pressed on until near the last climb when we were compelled to take refuge in a cleft of rocks as a cloud of rain and snow swept over the summit obscuring all things and making us decidedly chilly. We waited nearly half an hour until it had cleared, when we climbed up the rocks to the summit and had a fine view of the country for miles and miles. The haze bothered the view through the glass somewhat, 'twas a sight worth all the trouble and patience required to mount to this altitude. One mountain, said to be in Utah, 150 miles distant, could be seen indistinctly. The valley and mountains near were a fine sight, and we could see the Colorado river a long distance winding through the country. We took a short-cut down the upper mountain and when we reached the saddle I was about done up and had to call a halt, and the rest of the way down to the ranch was very tedious for me. The ladies had hot coffee ready when we returned, and we partook, with relish, of both sandwiches and coffee. We had a pleasant drive home through the glooming and next morning were all right once more.

The water supply of Flagstaff is gathered from the mountains. The reservoir is near the foot of them and a fine water supply is the result, the supply being amply sufficient for the town, railroad, mill and electric light plant.
