KELLEY OF BUFFALO IN TROUBLE AT SAYRE

Appropriated Traveling Man's Grip and Later Attempted to Steal a Slipper in a Clothing Store.

William Kelley, who claims to hail from Buffalo, and who exhibited a card showing that he was a member of the grain shovellers union, got into a peck of trouble here yesterday afternoon when he appropriated to his own use a traveling bag belonging to a commercial traveler from Binghamton, and later was kicked out of H. Sattler's clothing store for attempting to steal a slipper which was lying on one of the show counters. Kelley had been hanging about the men's waiting room at the Lehigh Valley station nearly all the afternoon. He was about half drunk, but as he was not making any disturbance but little attention was paid to him. About three o'clock A. G. Grant, a traveling salesman from Thuit Brothers of Binghamton, came into the station to wait for one of the west-bound trains. He carried a traveling bag which he left in one of the seats while he went to the new stand to make a purchase. While transacting while he went to the news stand to tend himself to the unprotected grip. The traveling man missed the grip and at once informed D. J. Kendig, the station agent. The latter got busy and finally found a man who saw Kelley take the grip. Kelley was traced to Sattler's store and there it was learned that he came in there and had attempted to steal a slipper, but had been caught in the act and was kicked out. Kelley carried the grip with him when he went into the store, and this was thrown after him when he went out. Officer I. H. Stephens located Kelley in Vall Brothers saloon and placed him under arrest on a charge of drunkenness. He was placed in the lockup and later in the afternoon a warrant was sworn out before Justice Carey charging larceny. He spent the night in jail and was given a hearing this morning at ten o'clock.

FLYNN GUILTY OF STEALING CLOTHES

Five Italians to Whom He is Alleged to Have Sold the Goods Were Discharged.

In court yesterday afternoon Pat Flynn, a hobo, was convicted of stealing clothing and shoes from the Lehigh Valley Railroad company. Sentence was deferred. Flynn, who is a typical bum and a member of the out-of-work clan, pilfered a Lehigh car early in December. The officers were not long in locating him. It was discovered also that he had disposed of part of his loot to five Italians, who were also charged with receiving. The Italians were brought up for trial yesterday but owing to the fact that the company could not prove the taking of the property they were discharged.

LEWIS M. MORTON DIED THIS MORNING

Aged and Respected Resident of Sayre Expired After Short Illness.

Lewis M. Morton, an aged and respected citizen of Sayre, died at his home, corner of Lockhart and River streets, this morning at four o'clock. Paralysis was the cause of death, he having sustained a stroke on Friday last, since which time he failed rapidly.

The deceased was a resident of Sayre since 1874, and was therefore one of the oldest citizens of the place. He was born in Groton, N. Y., in 1839, and spent his boyhood days in that place. For the past 23 years he had been employed by the Lehigh Valley as a carpenter in the Sayre shops. He was a school director when the high school building was erected and also served one term as councilman from the third ward. He was highly respected by a large circle of friends by whom his demise will be sincerely regretted.

Besides his wife, he is survived by four sons, Merton, of Syracuse; William of Waverly; and Charles and Henry of Sayre. The interment will take place at Tioga Point cemetery, but all the arrangements for the funeral are not yet completed.

CHARGED WITH STEALING BRASS

Dillon Threw Away Package Which Contained the Brass When Officer Approached.

Edward Dillon, of no where in particular, arrived in Sayre yesterday, and he was not here long before he was introduced to a cell in the borough "bug house." Dillon is charged with stealing two brass engine connections, the property of the Lehigh Valley, which it is claimed he endeavored to sell to various merchants. Dillon was arrested by Special Officer Kendig, on a warrant issued by Justice Carey. Kendig is also the station agent at the Lehigh Valley depot. He testified at the preliminary hearing last night that he saw Dillon going over the Packer avenue bridge, and that the man carried a bundle which he threw away when he saw the officer approaching. The bundle was picked up by Mr. Kendig and it contained two brass connections which it is claimed belonged to the company. Dillon, who appeared to be perfectly able to take care of his own rights, asked to see the brass but as it was locked up in the special officer's office at the station, it was impossible to have it at the hearing. Adjudgment was therefore taken until ten o'clock this morning.

LAWYER IS FATALLY STRICKEN IN COURT.
Succumbs to Heart Failure a Few Minutes After Making His Argument.

Montrose.—C. O. Dorshelmer of the Wyoming county bar, while engaged in the trial of an important trespass case at Montrose, was stricken with heart failure and died while seated at the counsel table in the presence of his associates.

E. W. Safford and W. D. B. Ainey represented the plaintiff, and G. P. and R. B. Little were associated with Mr. Dorshelmer for the defendant, the Lehigh Valley Railroad company. Mr. Safford had made an offer of evidence, and Mr. Dorshelmer arose and stated his objections in a clear and able manner. He resumed his seat, but before he could speak again he began to show signs of distress.

Enthusiastic Meeting Held Last Night for That Purpose in P. O. S. of A. Hall.

The members of the Order of the Golden Seal met last night in P. O. S. of A. Hall for the purpose of organizing a camp of the order. After an address by District Organizer W. H. Y., who explained the objects and working of the order in a most comprehensive manner, officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Past Commander, Thomas Dunkley; most eminent commander, D. A. K. Corbin; secretary, F. E. Seager; treasurer, Charles Goodhall; chaplain, Mrs. H. G. Muir; orderly, Mrs. Oscar Carrier; picket, Mrs. Belle Hoyt; scout, J. Fred Miller; trustee for three years, D. B. Miller; trustee for two years, Dr. A. K. Corbin, and trustee for one year, Thomas Dunkley. CHARGES AMONG VALLEY OFFICIALS

Several Trainmasters Appointed—Still Awaiting a Superintendent for Wyoming.

Several changes have been made among the official force of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, all of which went into effect February 1st. Among the changes are the following: G. W. Hardcastle, appointed trainmaster, with office at Jersey City, with jurisdiction from Park View east, including Newark.

The jurisdiction of R. G. Kealy, trainmaster, with office at Easton, has been defined as extending from Park View to Lizard Creek Junction, including Pottsville branch.

J. A. Smith has been appointed trainmaster, with office at Packerton. His jurisdiction extends from Lizard Creek Junction to Mauch Chunk.

The position of general yardmaster at Packerton has been abolished.

G. R. Haas has been appointed night trainmaster, with office at Easton.

J. T. Barrett, formerly located at Buffalo, has been appointed assistant yardmaster at Jersey City, with office at that point. He is succeeded at Buffalo by T. J. Flynn.

In Wilkes-Barre the work of the division superintendent is being conducted by Chief Clerk J. F. Hevey, assisted by Trainmaster Schatzel. No appointment has as yet been made to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Superintendent McGuire, to the office of assistant general manager, with offices at Bethlehem.

TAX DISPUTE WAS SETTLED YESTERDAY

Borough Refunds Money Paid By Traction Company, and the Case in Court is Dropped.

The tax dispute between the Waverly, Sayre and Athens Traction company and Sayre borough, which has been in the courts of Bradford county since 1901, was settled yesterday in an amicable manner, the borough paying to the traction company the sum of \$101 besides liquidating the costs of suit. It will be remembered that the borough collected the amount mentioned above of the traction company for taxes, and that the company paid under protest, taking the ground that it was exempt from borough taxes under the state law. Afterward the Traction company commenced suit against the borough to recover the sum and yesterday, on advice of counsel, the borough paid the company's claim and the costs, which amounted to more than the original sum involved.

A party of swindlers consisting of two men and two women have been working in Hazleton, Bloomsburg and Berwick and were last heard from at Shamokin. The manner of getting money is by seeking subscriptions for a home for orphans, at the same time exhibiting a paper called "Sunshine" that was issued in behalf of the home, and those who contributed \$1 were given the paper for one year. The attention of the authorities was called to the matter and when looked up no home for orphans could be found and the "Sunshine" paper found to be a fake. Two of the party were arrested at Pottsville by Honesdale constables on Friday.

Expense Accounts Must Be Filed.
It has been generally supposed that the Corrupt Practices Act, relating to primary elections, would free all defeated candidates at such primaries, or even caucuses from filing papers, but a careful perusal of the provisions of the act shows that this supposition is wrong, and every candidate who stood for the nomination for a city, ward, borough, township or other office at the recent primaries held throughout the county will have to file his statement or affidavit.

Section 5 of the act, provides that every candidate at any primary election, caucus or convention, whether nominated thereat or not, shall within 15 days after the same was held, if the amount received or expended shall exceed the sum of \$50, and every candidate for election, and every treasurer of a political committee, or person acting as such treasurer, shall within 30 days after every election at which such candidate was voted for, or which such political committee was concerned, if the amount received or expended shall exceed the sum of \$50 filed with the officers hereinafter specified a full, true and detailed account, subscribed and sworn or affirmed to by him, before an officer authorized to administer oaths, setting forth each and every sum of money contributed, received or disbursed by him for election purposes, the date of each contribution, receipt and disbursement, the name of the person from whom received, or to whom paid, and the object or purpose for which the same was disbursed.
