RECOMMENDED TO MERCY OF THE COURT

James Smith Convicted of Cutting and Felling Timber Trees on the Lands of Another.

The jury in the case of James Smith, charged with cutting and felling trees, knowing them to be on the lands of another, came in to court late yesterday afternoon and announced a verdict of guilty, with a recommendation to the judge for mercy. Smith is an aged resident of Athens township. Two years ago he took a contract to clear a strip of land for T. P. Maney on the latter's plot across the Susquehanna river. If he did the work according to contract he was to have another strip to clear under the same terms which governed the first contract. Maney claims that Smith did not perform according to contract and therefore would not enter into a second one. Smith, however, proceeded to cut timber on Maney's lands not included in the agreement, and persisted in doing so after having been ordered to stop. He was arrested last fall charged with stealing and the case went before the September grand jury. That body failed to find an indictment, and later the trial was an interesting one from a legal standpoint and the jury was out nearly all day.

After his last arrest Smith began a suit against Maney for damages, claiming that he had been injured to the extent of \$10,000 by Maney persistently prosecuting him. Just what will become of this suit cannot at the present time be determined.

"MRS. CAMPBELL" OF NEW "YAWK"

Concert Promoter, and "Teacher" of "Higher" English, Leaves for Greener Pastures, After Threatening to Put a Professional Man Out of Business.

Residents of the valley who have purchased tickets for a concert to be given in the Masonic hall at Waverly on February 26th, under the direction of a woman who calls herself "Mrs. E. C. Campbell of New Yawk," will lay the pieces of pasteboard away as mementos of a musical event which failed to materialize. Much has been said of "Mrs. Campbell" in the public prints and a description of her is unnecessary, as that, too, has been printed in detail.

The woman came to Sayre about ten days ago. She announced that she was a member of a concert company which was in Binghamton and which she would bring to Waverly. She came to The Record office and ordered tickets printed. She laid down the cash for the tickets and ordered window cards, a much more expensive job than the tickets, but she failed to produce the coin in payment for the latter job. She returned in a couple days and wanted to know if her window cards were printed. She was told that she had neglected to pay in advance and that The Record was not in the habit of doing work for strangers without the cash in advance. Then "Mrs. Campbell" executed a war dance and delivered herself of a class of language which is not in use by polite society. She went out very much disgusted, saying that the people of Sayre were the most ignorant she had ever met.

Now it is learned that the woman abused nearly every one who failed to do business with her on her terms. She went to a well known professional man's office in Waverly and endeavored to sell the man's wife tickets for the concert and she also wanted to sell advertising space on a program. Simply because the wife of the professional man politely declined to purchase tickets or advertising the woman unloosed her tongue at both ends indulging in remarks unbecomingly a lady, until she was ordered from the house. The following morning the professional man received a letter from "Mrs. Campbell," a verbatim copy of which follows:

Waverly, N. Y., Feb. 2, 1907.

Dear Sir:— I called at your office this morning to get a subscription on a concert program, I talked with your wife, she told me she would not take the advertisement but would give a donation I offered her two tickets, which to my intelligence meant a donation. It would be quite wearisome to go into detail of the situation, but I shall tell you the most important part of it. In the first place I am Miss Campbell who has the School of Language and Higher English on fifth avenue, New York, I am also a writer connected with a paper and magazines, and write songs. I personally am bringing a great singer here, I am very well known all through the country. But to get to the point your wife ordered me out of the office, without the slightest provocation, something that never in all my life I have been subjected to, she told me I was from the "bowery" and what alley on the bowery did I come from and screamed it down the stairs until the young man in my carriage was startled. I live on Long Island Sound not on the "bowery" but let me say I have three or four times visited the "bowery" and it has never been my misfortune to meet or hear anything like I heard from your wife this morning, she tells me she is used to meeting educated people, it would be impossible for me to believe it, I should rather say that she was a "billings gate woman" and if she is practicing some of the out law manners and customs of Missouri, I would strongly advise you to suppress her, because in the East we are not used to such people except "degenerates," to sum the whole thing I would say that except you apologize to me I shall write you up in the New York papers and I shall also tell every one in Waverly which will completely put you out of business. I have a witness who was at the bottom of the stairs and heard all. My prestige does not extend to Waverly but all over the country and I say to you that you must make amends for this insult or there will be trouble.

FIRE CONSUMED COAL BUILDING

Midnight Alarm Called Firemen to a Blaze Which Was Extinguished With a Garden Hose.

The tooting of nearly all the engine whistles in the Sayre yards at 11:15 last night called the firemen to a blaze which originated in a coal shed in the rear of the premises on Thomas avenue, occupied by Tom Peters, and owned by Martin Gallagher of Niagara Falls.

The fire is thought to have started from a spark from a Lehigh Valley engine and John Eddy, one of Sayre's valliant fire fighters, extinguished the blaze with a garden hose before much damage was done. Despite the fact that the engine whistles began tooting when the flames first broke out it was fully fifteen minutes before the general alarm was sounded. The following firemen responded and participated in extinguishing the blaze: Chief J. C. Wood, E. A. Wilber, Ray LaMont, J. N. Wilking, James E. Lyon, John Hammond, G. E. Hendrick, John Eddy and Harry Zellar.

The building was of not much value and no insurance was carried. The loss is total.

HAS THE POPULATION OF SAYRE INCREASED?

Mooted Question as to Whether the Town Has Any More Men Inhabitants Than It Contained a Year Ago.

Ever since the new Lehigh Valley shops, which are conceded to be on a mammoth scale, began operations here over a year ago, it has been a mooted question as to whether the industry has materially increased Sayre's population. While the shops were in the course of construction the hopes of the merchants, and other engaged in business, ran high. It was expected that the new shops would bring a large number of men and their families to Sayre, but now over a year has passed since the shops started, and good business men, who have watched Sayre grow, and know the conditions, are unable to say definitely whether the new shops have been instrumental in increasing the population of this place or not. This assertion was given a practical demonstration last night in Justice Carey's office when the depositions were taken in the matter of an application of William Donahue for a license to conduct an eating house in Sayre borough. The question was asked several business men, as to the increase in Sayre's population during the past year. None of them were able to state with anything like accuracy whether or not the new shops had added anything to Sayre's population. In fact, the consensus of opinion appeared to indicate that there are less skilled mechanics in Sayre than there were a year ago. It would seem, therefore that the new shops, which promised so much, are yielding but little.
