**ENGINEERS WIN; OTHERS LOSE.**  
**P. R. R. Eliminates Possibility of Trainmen's and Firemen's Strike.**  
 It is understood that General Manager Atterbury of the Pennsylvania Railroad, agreed to the demands of engineers that their schedule be so revised that their hours shall be reduced and by so doing has eliminated all possibility of a strike among the other employees.  
 The Grievance Committee representing the Brotherhood of Trainmen and Firemen, which threatened to tie up the road because they failed to get an advance in wages, was requested by the engineers on Tuesday to avoid extreme measures until they (the engineers) had further negotiated with the company. The request was granted, the engineers got what they wanted, and, as a result, the trainmen and firemen have lost all chance of succeeding by striking. They could do little without the support of the engineers.

**Congressman-Fleet Kipp Better.**  
 Two telegrams were received yesterday from Washington stating that Congressman-elect George W. Kipp is slightly improving, but would probably be confined to his bed for several days. Mr. Kipp has been in Washington for about ten days, and shortly after his arrival was taken ill. He was at first thought to have been suffering from appendicitis, but telegrams from his bedside would appear to indicate that this was an error.

**Conductor Injured.**  
 Charles Hatmaker, a conductor on J-WI was struck by a water tank near Meshoppen yesterday afternoon and quite seriously injured in the back and hips. Hatmaker was climbing down the ladder on the side of a freight car and fell to the tank which struck him and knocked him from the car. He fell in the ditch but was noticed by the trainmen who stopped the train and went to his assistance. He was taken to a physician at Meshoppen for treatment.

**Resumed Taking Testimony.**  
 The taking of depositions in the matter of the application of William Donahue for a license to conduct a restaurant and eating saloon in Sayre borough was resumed before Commissioner W. T. Carey this morning. Six witnesses were sworn for the respondents and the evidence of the witnesses both for and against the granting of the license will now be presented to Judge Fanning.

**Presbyterian Church Services.**  
 At the Presbyterian church tomorrow there will be the usual services at 10:30 and 7:30 with the pastor in charge. In place of the usual endeavor service there will be a union meeting of the Baptist and Presbyterian societies at 4 o'clock. Rev. A. F. von Tobel will speak and there will be brief addresses by others, special music, etc. This service will be of especial interest to young people.

**CLERK AUTHORIZED TO ASK FOR BIDS**

Special Council Meeting Last Night to Take Final Steps in Sewer Matter.  
 A special meeting of the borough council was held in the Packer hose rooms last night at which a resolution was introduced and passed authorizing the borough clerk to advertise for bids for the construction of a trunk line sewer over the route which has been printed from time to time in the Sayre papers. The bids are all to be in on March 12th and will be opened at a council meeting to be held on that date at 7:30 o'clock p. m.  
 The council will not meet again until the first Monday in March when the business of the past year will be settled up in readiness for the new council.

**JEALOUS ITALIAN ON THE WARPATH.**

Enraged Native of Italy Threatened to Kill Woman Whom He Preferred to Love.  
 Last night a warrant was issued by Justice Carey for the arrest of Pasquale Uliano, an Italian on complaint of Mrs. Marion Libbia, who charged that Uliano aimed a pistol at her and also threatened to shoot her. Uliano has not yet been located by the police.  
 From the story told to the justice in broken English it appears that Mrs. Libbia was married a few months ago, and that previous to this event Uliano had been a suitor for her hand. When the woman was married Uliano threatened to kill his rival and the woman he had married, but had never attempted to put the threat into execution until yesterday. Early in the afternoon Mrs. Libbia, who lives on Thomas avenue, went to the home of an Italian family with whom Uliano boarded. The man was there and when Mrs. Libbia entered and she alleges that as she stepped inside Uliano drew a pistol from his pocket and pointed it at her, at the same time threatening to shoot her. There were three or four men in the room and before the Italian, enraged by jealousy could discharge the weapon they seized him and took possession of the weapon. In the meantime, Mrs. Libbia ran to a bed room and locked herself on the inside. Chief Walsh was telephoned for, but when he arrived the Italian had decamped. Mrs. Libbia then appeared before Justice Carey and caused a warrant to be issued for the man's arrest. The police searched for the man last night but were unable to locate him.

**HOSTLER RUN DOWN BY LEHIGH ENGINE.**

Dense Steam Prevented His Seeing Locomotive and He Sustained Injuries to His Head.  
 John Bailey, a Lehigh Valley hostler, was struck by engine 2626 in the Southern Central yards this morning, and sustained injuries to the head which were of such a character as to render his removal to the hospital a necessity. Bailey was walking along the track on the ends of the ties, and on account of a dense cloud of steam could not see the approaching engine. The pilot beam struck him on the side of the head, inflicting a gash of considerable length. It was at first feared that he had been seriously injured. He was removed to the hospital at once, and after his injuries were dressed was able to go to his home. H. resides in Sayre.

**YESTERDAY'S WRECK NEAR SPENCER**

Fuller Details of a Most Remarkable Escape From a Terrible Casualty.  
 The accident which occurred to Lehigh passenger train No. 157 midway between West Danby and North Spencer just before noon yesterday resulted most fortunately for all on board, as no lives were lost and others who were on the train regarded the fact that no lives were lost as being most miraculous. The cause of the accident will perhaps never be known but it is believed to have been due to the spreading of the rails, although this assertion is doubted by some. The train consisted of an engine, mail car, baggage car, a day coach and Pullman. The first intimation that the passengers had that anything had occurred was when the coupling between the smoker and the day coach snapped in two. The day coach toppled over a ten foot embankment and brought up on its side. The Pullman followed to the edge of the embankment but did not turn over. The engine dragged the mail and baggage coaches for a distance of nearly two hundred feet and then these two coaches also turned over. The engine and tender for some unaccountable reason did not leave the rails.

These were nineteen passengers on board the train and nearly all of these were in the day coach. When the latter tumbled over the embankment the passengers were thrown rudely from their seats and one woman, Mrs. H. C. Weed, of West Danby, was thrown from her seat to the opposite side of the coach and was forced clear through the window. She sustained extensive lacerations about the head, and when taken from the coach was bleeding profusely. For a time considerable excitement prevailed among the passengers, but when it was found that there was no one injured they left the car in good order, some going through the doors, which had been opened, while others, made their exit through the windows. The conductor of the Pullman coach when he saw the woman taken from the coach with the blood streaming down her face, rushed to the telephone station and telephoned for doctors. It was this message that led the officials of the road to believe that a bad accident occurred. Fireman Grant of Stanley, N. Y., who was on the train, was somewhat injured, and a man whose name was not learned, had two ribs broken.

**WILKES-BARRE MAN KILLED BY TRAIN.**

Italian Fatally Injured at That City Last Evening.  
 Guancinto Trotta, aged 22 years, employed as a waiter at the Lehigh Valley station cafe, Wilkes-Barre, where he sold refreshments to passengers on the Valley trains; was fatally injured last evening by being run over by an engine just below the station. Trotta had completed his duties on the east bound Black Diamond express, leaving Wilkes-Barre at 5:27 p. m., and had jumped off the train, when he slipped on some ice and fell upon the next track, where the milk train was backing toward the depot. The tender struck him as he attempted to rise and the entire engine passed over his body before the train could be brought to a stop. He was unconscious when picked up. Both legs had been terribly crushed above the knees. He was conveyed to the Mercy hospital, where he died a few hours later. He was of Italian descent and had been employed at the place for the past two years.

**Two New Girders in Position.**

Yesterday the second mammoth steel girder for the new Lehigh Valley railroad bridge at Towanda was placed in position at the west end of the bridge with the service of the traveler. The girders which are 130 feet long and 10 feet high are lifted upon two flat cars by steel cranes and are then run under the traveler which picks up the girders and places them in position. The traveler is blocked up on the outer end for the placing of the first two girders but when they are laid no blocking will be necessary as it will be fastened to the last girder already in position. The traveler was built especially for this bridge, but may be used again on any two track bridge.
