WHEN HONDURAS IS READY.

Nicaragua Concentrating Forces on Frontier, Says Bonilla.

PANAMA, Feb. 12.—The following dispatch from President Bonilla of Honduras was sent in reply to a message asking for the Honduras side of the actual war situation with Nicaragua. The message is dated Tegucigalpa and says:

"Nicaragua is concentrating a considerable armed force upon the frontier of Honduras without having made a declaration of war. We are assured an invasion will take place as soon as Honduras is ready to repel the movement. President Zelaya of Nicaragua, it is said, believes that he holds the balance of power in Central America and wants to put the matter to a test. He will oppose intervention by the United States."
