Anxiety at Athens.

Athens—Great anxiety has been manifested today in a news item that appeared in the Philadelphia Record yesterday stating that an apparent tragedy had happened in the vicinity of Scranton when Capt. John Seymour and Wm. Knox while out hunting ducks had found frozen in the ice of Red Avon Pier two coats, a pair of trousers, a vest, two shirts, two pair of drawers, a glove marked "Bloomsfield" and other articles. States Attorney J. Harry Coningham found in the pockets a pocketbook containing a membership card of the Scranton Bridge and Structural Iron Works Union with the name Archie McVaugh which showed that the dues were paid up to April 9, 1906. Also a letter from his mother written from Lachine, N. Y., beside some samples of Godyear Rubber goods. Mr. McVaugh's father has been in Montreal several years but returned to Athens last week and is now with the American Bridge company working in Elmira. The younger Archie McVaugh has been employed in a bridge erecting squad and was last heard from in Ohio. He has two sisters residing in Athens and they have been telegraphing to different places today hoping to get tidings of their brother.

PASS 15 BILLS A MINUTE.

Vice President Fairbanks and Senator McCumber Do It Alone.

Washington—The Senate tonight broke all records by passing bills at the rate of fifteen a minute for one hour and six minutes.

The bills were pension measures on the calendar in which there was no objections. The number was 991 and all the time Mr. McCumber was the only Senator on the floor. Vice President Fairbanks presided.

Savings Banks Show Big Gains.

Albany—A summary of the reports of the Savings Banks of the State as to their condition on the morning of Jan. 1, issued by the State Banking Department shows an increase of nearly \$60,000,000 in resources and almost \$70,000,000 in amount due depositors.

Chambersburg, Pa.—Judge Gillan granted all the applications for liquor licenses, except four. In three cases the bonds were not regular, and these went over. In the fourth case W. L. Follinger refused to sign a paper to close his saloon on Christmas Day.
