MASSACRE PLANNED

Startling Tale In Brownsville "Shooting Up" Inquiry.

Ex-Infantry Man Mapp Heard Shoot ing and Challenges to Negroes From Outside Barrack Wall on Night of Affray.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 .- Startling testimony concerning alleged plans to massacre colored soldiers at Brownsville, Tex., by men from the town fir ing over the barracks to stampede the soldiers and challenges to them to 36 inch Taffeta come out of the barracks, was given by negro ex-soldiers at the investigation before the senate committee on military affairs. The most sensational story told was that of William Mapp, who was a member of Company C, Twenty-fifth infantry. He was on the stand when the hearing adjourned for the day.
