All the bars in Sayre were closed today on account of election.
The men in the shops did not work today, having been given a holiday on account of election.
"On Thanksgiving Day," is the attraction at the Loomis this evening.
Gorge Moscrip, a representative of Bradford county in the State legislature, was in Sayre today on official business.
A large number of persons have taken tumbles on the icy pavements today, but no serious injuries have as yet been reported.
The days have grown considerably in length and the sky begins to assume an appearance which indicates the approach of spring.

There are three cases of diphtheria in Sayre at the present time, all of which have been placed under strict quarantine by the board of health. These are the first cases to be reported in the borough in some time. There is no fear of the disease spreading.
One of the traction company cars left the rails in front of the power house last night. The car was loaded with passengers returning from the show, but aside from being somewhat rudely shaken up none of them were injured. The car was retracked with but little difficulty.
Friday is Washington's birthday, and it is a legal holiday. The banks will close, the postoffice will observe holiday hours, and the pupils in the public school will take a day's vacation. The men employed in the Lehigh Valley shops at this place will also be given a day's rest.
Election passed off quietly in Sayre today. There was little interest shown in the event and the vote is light. The prohibitions were busy at the polls all day and in at least two of the wards will make a good showing. The socialists were also busy and they are also expecting a big vote.
Governor Stuart has approved the resolution passed by the Legislature creating a commission to investigate the cost of living in Pennsylvania and report to the Legislature by March 15 next. The commission will consist of two senators and three representatives to be appointed by the presiding officers of the Senate and House and is allowed \$5,000 for expenses.

HOTEL ANNEX IS UNDER QUARANTINE

Health Board Takes Action in Diphtheria Case at the Wilbur House.
Miss Anna Donahue, who has been employed at the Wilbur House and dining room girl, for some time, is suffering from an attack of the diphtheria, and at a meeting of the health board held last night Health Officer Brougham was instructed to quarantine the western annex to the hotel, the room occupied by Miss Donahue being located in that portion of the hotel. When Dr. H. S. Fish, the attending physician, first reported the case to the board of health, the question of placing the entire hotel under quarantine was first deemed advisable, but when the matter was looked into thoroughly it was conceded that the borough might be liable for damages that might result from closing up the hotel. In order to settle the matter a meeting of the board was called for last evening. It developed that the diphtheria patient occupied a room in what is known as the western annex. The room is located on the fourth floor and is practically isolated from the general public. When these facts became known to the board it was the consensus of opinion among the members of the board that the interests of the public would be effectually protected by placing the western annex under quarantine. The health board also ordered that those who had been occupying rooms in the western annex should remove to other quarters.
After the meeting of the board of Health Officer Brougham went to the hotel and placed a rope at the head of the stairs leading to the annex. A sheet was hung on this rope and the quarantine card has been attached to the sheet.
The patient is reported this morning to be improving slowly and the disease is of a mild type.

SAYRE SCHOOL BOARD SETTLES WITH W. S. & A.

Fellows Example of Borough Council and Refunds Tax Money to Traction Company.
The Sayre borough school directors held a short special session last evening to take action with reference to the case of the Waverly, Sayre and Athens Traction Company versus the school district. It will be remembered that recently the borough council decided to refund to the traction company the money which had been paid by the latter for taxes. A similar case was pending with the school district and the directors at the meeting last night decided to follow in the footsteps of the council and reimburse the company. It was also decided to pay a bill amounting to \$75 presented by I. N. Evans for counsel fees.

MISSILE HURLED THROUGH WINDOW.

Unknown Misanthrope Threw Stone Through Window in Black Diamond Smoking Car.
Yesterday afternoon as No. 9, the Lehigh Valley's Black Diamond express, was rushing through the village of Lockwood, some unknown misanthrope hurled a piece of slag through one of the windows of the smoking coach. A passenger narrowly escaped being struck with the missile. The person who threw it has not as yet been identified. The Lehigh Valley detectives have been notified of the occurrence and will make a strenuous effort to bring the guilty parties to justice.

A Popular Pastor Resigns.

Much regret is felt over the resignation of Rev. J. E. Emanuel, as pastor of the Church of Christ at East Smithfield. No other minister within recent years has endeared himself to the people of all classes as Mr. Emanuel has regardless of creed or nationality. GEORGE RITZ DIED LAST EVENING

Well-Known Boiler Maker Succumbs to a Stroke of Apoplexy.
George Ritz died at his home, No. 307 North Lehigh avenue, Sayre at 10:47 o'clock last night of apoplexy, aged 52 years. He was born in Sullivan county, N. Y., where he resided in early life, but removed to Wilkes-Barre on arriving at the age of manhood. He was married to Miss Anna Drum of Wilkes-Barre and together they came to Sayre 26 years ago, where he worked at his trade as a boiler maker up to the time of his death. He was seized with his fatal illness while attending a meeting of his fellow craftsmen on Thursday evening. A joke was told by someone in the room and Mr. Ritz laughed heartily. He was seen to stagger and was taken home in a critical condition. Besides his wife seven children, Mrs. Sophia Howell of Waverly, Will G. Edward, Walter, and Ward of Sayre, and Nora and Louise, also of Sayre, survive. He was a member of the boiler makers' union, the Sayre Aerie of Eagles, the N. P. L. and the Keystone Guard of Athens. He was also a permanent member of the Episcopal church. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon when the remains may be viewed at his home from 12 to 1:30 o'clock p. m., and the services will be observed at the Episcopal church at 2:30 o'clock. The interment will take place at Tigoa Point cemetery.

MR WHITTLE TO LEAVE SAYRE.

Will Go to Miami, Florida, as Soon as He Can Close Up His Business Affairs Here.
Mrs. W. H. Whittle and son Jack left this morning for Miami, Florida, where they will reside in the future. Claims to Have Left One in Globe Store, and Carries Away One Belonging to a Clerk.

Yesterday afternoon Miss Ruth Myers, cashier at the Globe store, received a telephone message from a man who stated that a lady who had visited the store during the afternoon had left her muff in the establishment. Miss Myers told the man that she would have the matter looked up, and that if the muff was in the store it would be returned to the owner shortly after receiving the message. Miss Myers went to supper, inadvertently neglecting to tell the other members of the clerical force of the conversation over the telephone. During her absence a woman came into the store and stated to one of the clerks that she had left her muff in the store and that the bookkeeper had promised to find it for her. The clerks were unable to give the woman any information concerning the missing muff, but finally one of them went to the cashier's desk and seeing a muff lying on the desk held it up for the woman to look at. "That's the very article," she said, and the clerk gave it to her without further question. When Miss Myers returned, however, she was told of the woman's coming to the store, and then it developed that the muff which had been given to the woman belonged to Miss Myers. The woman, who is an entire stranger, has not been seen since, and no one appears to be able to locate her whereabouts. She said that the muff that she left in the store was made of seal skin, while the one belonging to Miss Myers was of ordinary fur. Just why she should not have been able to have discovered the difference is not made clear.
