GOLD RACKET FOR MACKAY.

Eastern States Amateur Rackets Champions Retains Title.
TUXEDO PARK, N. Y., Feb. 18.—Clarence H. Mackay of the New York Tennis and Racket club by defeating George H. Brooke, ex-amateur champion of the Philadelphia Racket club yesterday in three straight sets on the courts of the Tuxedo Tennis and Racket club retains his title as amateur champion of the eastern states for the gold racket. Mackay won the third leg on the gold racket, which now becomes his personal property.
Brooke started the service from the right hand side, scoring two aces by service in his first hand, while Mackay failed to score. In the second hand Brooke added another ace by placing and Mackay one by service. At this point Mackay, with 2 to 1 against him, evaded honors, and at the end of the third hand the score was 5 all. Mackay scored 3 in the next hand to Brooke's 2, and finally won out in the seventh hand at 15-8.
In the second game Mackay had things his own way, showing speed and accurate placing, while Brooke relied on his puzzling service, Mackay finally winning out at 15-8.
The third game was very stubbornly fought throughout, the score zig-zagging, with honors nearly even, up to the last hand, with the score 15-12 in Mackay's favor. At the end of his seventh hand Brooke lost a hard shot to the front wall, and Mackay scored the two necessary aces and the match with the eighth hand at 15-12. Both men were in their best form.

The "Flag to Flag" Race.
NASSAU, Bahamas Islands, Feb. 18.—The second or official division of the contestants in the "flag to flag" motor boat race from Miami, Fla., to Nassau finished here. The racers made a splendid run to this port, arriving as follows: The Daggit of New York, first; The Whiz of New Haven, second; and the Klondike of Miami, which was leading but ran into a fog, last. The Lee S., entered by J. P. Gerlach of New York, has not yet been heard from.

Four Greek Divers Lost.
PENSACOLA, Fla., Feb. 18.—News of the drowning of four Greek divers of this city in the gulf of Mexico near St. Andrews, Fla., has been received here. A fleet of sponge fishing boats were caught in a hurricane offshore, and one capsized with the four men, who clung to the upturned boat until washed off by the waves.

Shooting Mixed at Tucson.

CARDIFF, Feb. 18.—The British steamer Heliopolis was in collision off this coast Saturday midnight with the British steamer Orianda, outward bound from Penarth. The Orianda sank, and fourteen persons, including her captain, were drowned. The Heliopolis put into this port with her bows damaged.
