## ATHENS. THE RESULT IN ATHENS BOROUGH

But Little Interest and Only One-Third of the Vote Cast at Yesterday's Election.

Athens—The borough election yesterday was very quiet, only about one-third of the voters having paid any attention to it, and there was but little strife except for inspector in the First ward where F. E. Weller, the Lincoln candidate was elected over J. A. Gould, Republican. In the Third ward Frank M. Sutton was re-elected councilman and W. C. Morrison school director without opposition. In the Fourth ward the strife was on councilman between H. C. Stonier, Republican, W. R. Vance, Democrat and Wm. Schermerhorn, Prohibitionist. Although all of the rest of the ticket was strongly Republican the scales were reversed on councilman and Vance was elected by a majority of 171 over the two opposing candidates. **DECISION FAVORS HEARST.**  
Supreme Court Supports Attorney General Jackson's Position.  
ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 7.—Supreme Court Justice Fitta handed down decisions sustaining the position of Attorney General William E. Hearst in the matter of the proceedings in the interest of William E. Hearst to oust George B. McClellan from the office of mayor of New York city.

Justice Fitta decides that the attorney general has authority to rebare the application of Mr. Hearst for leave to begin quo warranto proceedings against McClellan, which was denied by his predecessor, Attorney General Mayer. Justice Fitta also denies the motion of McClellan's attorneys to have the attorney general adjudged in contempt of court on the ground that in bringing the action upon his own initiative to oust McClellan he violated the spirit if not the letter of a temporary injunction of Justice Fitta forbidding him, pending a hearing, to reopen the matter of Hearst's quo warranto application.
