TOM DANGERFIELD AGAIN IN CUSTODY

Colored Burglar Wanted Here for Sentence Will Be Brought Back By Sheriff Griffin.

Tom Dangerfield, who in the past two years has caused no end of trouble for the police officers of Sayre and Athens, has been located at Cleveland and Sheriff Griffin is now on his way to that city armed with a bench warrant to bring the slippery Thomas back to Bradford county. Thomas is wanted by the Bradford county authorities for sentence. Last summer Thomas entered a residence in Athens without having first obtained permission of the owner. He was arrested, tried and convicted, but for some reason was not sentenced and was declared forfeited. The other day word came that Thomas was in Cleveland, so a bench warrant was issued and he will be brought back. Thomas will probably get put away for a considerable time, as he is a bad citizen, and his criminal record is a long one. Thomas attempted to rob the Presbyterian church at this place a couple of years ago, and was caught in the act. He served time for this job, and has since been in several scrapes of a similar character.

MUST ESCHUE LIQUORS.

Railroad Employees Will Have to Keep Sober or Else Quit Their Jobs.

It is understood that the various railroads are about to issue orders to their employees that intemperance will not be tolerated and that employees who habitually frequent saloons will be discharged, and those who reside at hotels will be asked to secure private boarding houses. All of the roads who are in favor of any movement that will prevent intemperance and at a meeting held in New York it was decided to issue these general orders. The companies feel that railroad men in order to prevent accidents and perform their duties must have clear minds, and they cannot perform their work as it should be performed when continually indulging in intoxicants.

THOMAS J. DESMOND DIED AT THE HOSPITAL.

Popular Young Lehigh Brakeman Succumbs to Typhoid Fever.

Thomas J. Desmond, a young Lehigh Valley brakeman, who has been employed by the company for the past year, died this morning at the Packard hospital of typhoid fever. The deceased formerly resided with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Desmond, of Rome township, and he came to Sayre about one year ago. He was 23 years of age and was well liked and respected by all who had formed his acquaintance. His body was shipped to his former home on No. 4 this afternoon. The funeral will be held at Towanda on Saturday. Undertaker P. H. O'Shea of this place, has charge of the funeral arrangements.

HOSE COMPANY TO PRESENT PLAY.

\$100,000,000 STOCK ISSUE.

Pennsylvania Stockholders Will Be Asked to Authorize It.

New York—The Pennsylvania Railroad Co. announced through its representatives in this city that it has sold \$50,000,000 in three-year 5 per cent. notes. The company also announced that the proposed increase of \$100,000,000 each in bonds and stock which the stockholders will be asked to authorize at a meeting on March 4 will not be used this year.

The statement of the company says that this sum, with the proceeds from the sales of stocks of other companies heretofore made, will meet all financial requirements of the company this year for construction expenditures and otherwise, including the New York terminal; also \$50,000,000 of notes maturing November 1 next.

A Lehigh Valley freight car, No. 3902, containing a consignment of merchandise was broken open by unknown thieves while in transit from Towanda to Monroeton. A box of trape nuts was taken. The thieves have not as yet been identified.

WOMAN WAITED; HUSBAND CAME NOT

After Spending All Night at Lehigh Station Waiting for Recrunt Spouse She Needed the Services of a Physician.

After spending the long hours of last night in the ladies' waiting room of the Lehigh Valley station at this place, anxiously and vainly watching for a recreant husband who came not, Mrs. Blanche Sitter, a slip of a girl who says she is only eighteen, started the passengers waiting for No. 8, by falling from her seat to the floor in a swoon. When those in the waiting room reached her side the woman was unconscious. A messenger was sent for Dr. H. S. Fish, and in the meantime Station Agent Kendig provided a cot which was placed in the ladies' toilet room and upon which the woman was laid. After examining the woman's condition Dr. Fish stated that she was suffering from heart trouble and that there was a slight inclination toward hysterics which had probably been induced by her anxious vigil during the night. Heart remedies were administered and the woman regained consciousness. Then she told her story.

She said that she was married to her husband about one month ago in Corning, N. Y., after a courtship which began only a few weeks previous. Recently she had been living in Towanda while her husband has been employed in Sayre. Yesterday she wrote him that she was coming to this place, and asked him to meet her at the station. She came to Sayre last night, but her husband was not on hand to meet her. She endeavored to locate him by telephone, but in this was unsuccessful. She also made inquiries among the railroad men, but they were unable to give her any information. Then she decided to wait at the station, hoping that her husband, who is employed by the Lehigh, would come to the station. She waited all night, but he came not, and this morning tired nature gave way. Her wants were attended to by the station officials and an effort will be made to find her husband.

MOTORMAN OF WRECKED TRAIN EXONERATED.

Wellsboro, Pa.—Edward R. Rogers, motorman of the electric train on the Harlem division of the New York Central which jumped the track Saturday night, resulting in the loss of twenty lives, formerly lived here. He was a locomotive engineer for the Fall Brook and New York Central. Though arrested after the accident he was released on his own recognizance. His friends are glad to learn that the company attach no blame to him, declaring that he was running on schedule time and that the disaster was due to causes beyond his control.

Rogers had been an engineer in the New York subway, but recently left it to accept one with the New York Central in the electric system instructing engineers in the driving of electric motors. He has always been a careful, conservative driver and thorough electrician.
