**TWENTY-TWO IN JAIL**  
Campaign Against Black Handers Breaks Up Gang.  
WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 25.—With twenty-two of them in jail in this city and over fifty others fleeing from the state it is believed that the Black Hand society which has terrorized the upper section of Luzerne county for some years is now broken up. This condition is the result of a wholesale raid planned for weeks in order that the ax might be laid at the roots in a single sweeping blow at the foul organization which has made the lives of hundreds of peaceful Italians of the mining towns of this county a condition of terror for years past.  
Of the twenty-two in jail sixteen have been held without bail on charges of attempted murder, robbery, conspiracy, dynamiting and threats, and the remaining six are held under such heavy bail for the same charges, with the exception of attempted murder, that there is no likelihood of their getting out.  
For the last five years the Black Hand society members have had virtually a free hand in this county. They have systematically levied tribute upon hundreds of Italians. The district attorney's office until the advent of the state constabulary had no requisite force to gather evidence and to make wholesale arrests.  
There have been scores of outrages. Murders have been committed, houses have been dynamited, men have been waylaid and wounded, women have been terrorized, houses have been fired upon or set on fire, but rarely have any arrests followed.  
The opportunity of the authorities came through the courage of Joseph Salvatore and Charles Rizzo, three hardworking and thrifty Italians of Upper Pittston, who, themselves victims of the tribute system, in order to protect their families finally rebelled and gave information upon which the raid was based and identified twenty-two of the twenty-five men arrested as Black Hand members.

**Fire Destroys Presbyterian Chapel**  
TROY, N. Y., Feb. 25.—Woodside Presbyterian chapel was destroyed by fire here yesterday. The loss is \$32,000. The chapel was erected for the church by James A. and I. Townsend Burden and Mrs. Margaret E. Proud. Within less than twenty-four hours ten alarms of fire were sounded, breaking the record. The first nine were for slight blazes. The last was for the chapel fire.

**Worst Storm of Winter at Geneva.**  
GENEVA, N. Y., Feb. 25.—Geneva and surrounding country districts are in the grasp of the worst storm of the winter. Snow, driven before a gale from the south, piled into huge drifts. City and interurban electric lines were badly crippled, and steam trains were all reported late.

He had conducted a grocery store in Elmira for some time, and was 55 years of age. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock, and the remains will be brought to Waverly tomorrow morning and buried in Glenwood cemetery. E. S. Haford will have the funeral in charge. The deceased is survived by his wife and one sister, who lives in Alaska.
