GIRL SAID THAT SHE WAS SUFFERING FROM HEART TROUBLE

Lay on the Floor of the D. L. & W. Station for Half an Hour This Morning Then Got Up and Departed.

When further questioned she said that she had had two similar attacks while at Sayre yesterday. She also said that she was married, and that she was expecting her husband, who was in Elmira, to come down on the train that was due at about that time. The train came and went, but no one alighted who seemed to know her. After lying on the floor for a while longer she arose and left the station.

SOME PARTY MEN DON'T LIKE ISSUE.

Republican Wish to Support Ticket, But Many Are Opposed to Municipal Ownership of Public Utilities.

Waverly—The action of the Village Republican committee at the meeting held a few days ago for the purpose of making plans for the coming village election, seems to have led to considerable dissatisfaction among some of the members of the G. O. P. The committee decided that the campaign should rest upon the issue of municipal ownership of the public utilities; the water works, of course, being the case in point. Some of the Republicans express a desire to support the Republican ticket, but announce themselves as being opposed to the public ownership of public utilities. As one Republican expressed it, "I want to support the Republican ticket, but do not want to come out in favor of municipal ownership because I am opposed to it." Some are clamoring for a union ticket, and express a desire to have party lines eliminated.

Blizzard Blocked Roads.

Waverly—The blizzard of last Sunday drifted the snow to such an extent in some parts of the county that the roads were almost impassable. Some of the rural mail deliveries were unable to get through, being forced to return without delivering the mail. In places the roads were piled so full of snow that it was necessary to take to the open field in order to get through.

A Record representative telephoned to the hospital and the person who answered the phone was unable to give out any information.

Later in the evening a kind hearted citizen gave her two dollars and told her to go to a hotel and secure accommodations for the night. The woman appears to be suffering from fits and it seems as if she ought to be cared for by friends or the authorities.
