

**KICK ON REASSESSMENTS.**  
Real Estate Promoters Making Trouble for Commissioners.

Media, Pa.—The real estate promoters and those who are buying and selling land in Delaware county, especially in the counties in the northern part and along the northern border, where properties are selling at enormous figures, do not take kindly to the reassessment begun by the County Commissioners, and in their transfers are giving the latter as much trouble as possible.

The matter was originally taken up by the commissioners from the amount of money mentioned in the consummation of deals, in which land assessed and taxed as farm land was being sold for almost fabulous prices.

It is alleged that to entangle the assessors who are working on the reassessment all properties are being sold for a nominal sum, which as quoted, "for the sum of \$1 and other lawful money of the United States," is said to be all that is necessary under the existing law. This places the commissioners at a disadvantage and gives a greater chance to appeal, and until it is overcome the assessors scarcely know how to act.

### ATHENS.

**Library Club Meeting.**  
Athens—The meeting of the Ladies' Library club yesterday afternoon was an informal gathering for their own amusement and enjoyment—one of that class of social gatherings where one feels as though they had been wise long enough and the time had come to throw off their dignity and have a good time. The jokes and anecdotes they spun off would fill a good sized book and they were thoroughly enjoyed. Mrs. Estabrook created a great deal of merriment by reading some exercises or pronouncements showing how easy it was to get tripped up on the English diction. Had President Roosevelt been there he would have been convinced that his efforts for spelling reform were eclipsed by the ladies of the Library club. After the program that was not a program was completed they had refreshments and a social good time generally. We have not seen the critic yet and so can not give anything farther about the meeting.

**MORE PAY FOR MAIL MEN.**  
Says a Washington special of Feb. 20: Ninety per cent. of the postal employees are affected by provisions in the postoffice appropriation bill increasing salaries. These provisions, which were eliminated on points of order raised in the House during debate on the bill were all restored under a special rule before the House passed the bill.  
By the terms of the amendments reported from the Committee on Rules seven grades of clerks are established in first and second class offices, with salaries ranging from \$600 to \$1,200. City letter carriers are divided into five grades, with salaries ranging from \$600 to \$1,100. Railway mail clerks are divided into six grades below that of chief clerk, salaries in each grade being increased from \$800 to \$1,700. The maximum salary of rural carriers is fixed at \$540. Another section provides that the postmaster general may allow a railway mail clerk 30 days' sick leave in any fiscal year with pay.  
This bill has been passed by the House; it now goes to the Senate and if passed by that body will become effective July 1, 1917, as the President is sure to approve of it, having already expressed himself favorable to it.

People familiar with conditions along the river say that things are shaping up for a big flood when the break up comes. A solid body of ice bridges the channel for a hundred miles, and when this breaks up it will pile up and dam back the water.

**Mr. Esther Brown.**  
Athens—Mrs. Esther Brown died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Hatfield Webb, 114 Pennsylvania avenue last evening at 6 o'clock, aged 84 years. Her maiden name was Hemmaway and she was born in Waverly, N. Y. She was first married to Cornelius Corby, and afterwards to Lorenzo West, and lastly to Ruel R. Brown, who died 19 years ago. She was a member of the Methodist church from childhood first joining the Waverly church. One son Arthur Corby died in the army in the civil war. She leaves two sons surviving her, James Corby of Shessequin, David Corby of Passaic, N. J., and one daughter, Mrs. Harriet Webb of Athens, Pa. She had been sick about five weeks the first of her illness dating when she came from East Athens to attend the funeral of Cyrus Webb. Her funeral will take place from the home residence, 114 Pennsylvania avenue tomorrow at 2 o'clock Rev. Dr. Simpson, officiating. Burial at Tioga Point cemetery.
