SUBPOENAS EVELYN

Jerome to Call Thaw's Wife as State Witness.

WOULD VOID HIS MARRIAGE AND WILL

May McKenzie, Two "Florodora" Chorus Girls and Young Nesbit to Go on Stand For State—Countess Would Part Couple.

NEW YORK, March 9.—A subpoena was served upon Evelyn Nesbit Thaw at the Hotel Lorraine commanding her to turn over to the district attorney all the letters she ever received from Harry Thaw or Stanford White.

What good they are going to do the district attorney is a question asked here, as it is not likely that Mrs. Thaw has kept any correspondence that would endanger her husband's safety.

When the trial of Harry Thaw is resumed on Monday the district attorney will call as his first witness in rebuttal Evelyn Nesbit Thaw's chorus girl friend, May McKenzie. A subpoena has been served on Miss McKenzie at the Hotel Lorraine, where she is living with the Thaws, notifying her that she will be called the first thing on Monday morning.

Mr. Jerome has secured from Maxie Follette and Edna Chase, two of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw's companions in 1902, certain new facts affecting the truth of the story told by Harry Thaw's wife of her wrong at the hands of Stanford White.

Under rules of evidence it would be impossible for Mr. Jerome to use this ammunition upon Evelyn Thaw directly, but he expects to get it to the jury by means of questions to May McKenzie. She is assumed to be in a position to know the truth or falsity of the charges made by the other two women.

Mr. Jerome has also summoned Mrs. J. J. Calne of Boston, who already has testified for the defense. Among the other known witnesses for the state are Drs. Bingham of Pittsburg and Deemar of Kittanning, Pa., the Thaw and Copley family physicians.

Mr. Jerome undoubtedly will again summon Abraham Hummel, a lawyer, to the stand to testify as to the affidavit Evelyn Nesbit Thaw is alleged to have signed charging Thaw with cruelty because she "would not tell lies" about Stanford White.

Howard Nesbit, it is said, will be called to the stand to testify that his sister told him Thaw had treated her cruelly while abroad in 1903 because she "would not tell lies" about Stanford White.

The district attorney's office has been holding Miss McKenzie under a subpoena ever since the trial began. It is known of course that the young woman, while called as a witness for the prosecution, is in reality bitterly hostile to the state, and a spirited scene is anticipated when Mr. Jerome crosses with the alert and spry little woman who used to dance so nimbly in the Weber-Fields show.

The subpoena served on Mrs. Thaw was in the nature of a great surprise to her and also the counsel for the defense.

Interest in the celebrated case was heightened by reports that Thaw's family had determined to separate him from his wife should a verdict be returned in his favor.

Howard Nesbit, the young brother of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, was responsible for the rumors of possible estrangement.

"The Countess of Yarmouth," young Nesbit declared, "has said that it is possible will not return to England until her brother and my sister have been separated."

It was the original intention of the prosecution to use young Nesbit's story to offset the testimony of his sister, but several weeks ago he declared that he would not testify for the prosecution and go against his own "flesh and blood."

Adjournment until Monday was announced five minutes after court opened. Delphin M. Delmas' plan to rest the defense with the testimony of Mrs. William Thaw had caught the district attorney napping, and he had to admit it in court. The delay seemed to exasperate the defendant.

It is likely that Mrs. Thaw will be called to testify on Monday, and it is expected that her examination in rebuttal will be one of the most trying periods of her long ordeal.

WAS IRON AGAINST WOOD.

Don Ramon Pina Makes Reply to Dewey's "Divine Aid" Speech.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—"My mission to the United States is to help cement new ties of friendship," said Senator Don Ramon Pina, the new Spanish minister in an interview. "I have not come here," continued the minister, "to remind the American government that it defeated us in a conflict, but I have come on a mission to help both countries live down the unpleasant past."

When his attention was called to a recent communication Admiral Dewey addressed to a correspondent in which the hero of Manila bay said that he had won his victory over the Spanish fleet by "divine aid" Senator Pina said:

"Please do not consider me irreverent, but if Admiral Dewey won his victory over the fleet of our navy in Manila bay by 'divine aid' I think it must have been the 'god of war,' the aid that iron gave him in conquering wood."

Senator Pina said that his country had prospered greatly since the war and intimated that defeat by America really developed in a benefit to it rather than a disadvantage.

"I caused the people to awake to the realization," he said, "that they must be up and doing to keep pace with the times, particularly with American progress, and following this both political and commercial conditions have greatly improved."

Senator Pina is the first Spanish minister to Washington since the retirement of Senator Ojeda in 1905. Since that time the legation has been in charge of Luis Pastor, the first secretary of the legation.

DOWN ON LYNCHING.

Former Governor of Virginia Says Strong Constabulary Is Needed.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 9.—A. J. Montague, formerly governor of Virginia, gave an address at Harvard university last night, in which he touched on the subject of lynching in the south. He said in part:

"Some of us are taught to favor lynching and therefore to fear the strong arm of federal power. This barbaric malady will not be finally eradicated in America until the people exercise a self restraint born of conviction and not of fear. In our system of government, above all others, there is no place for private or personal vengeance. I think that a strong constabulary is the best school to teach the virtue of self restraint and the beneficence of law and order over riot and murder."

"I give it as my deliberate opinion, shared by the bulk of the law-abiding people of the southland, that there is never an occasion where resort to lynch law is justifiable among civilized people. Such practices snuff the fundamental bonds of society and will eventually in a government as capricious and as relentless as that of wild beasts."

Commons Defeats Woman Suffrage. LONDON, March 9.—The bill to extend the right of suffrage to women was defeated in the house of commons, where it was talked to death without coming to a vote.

W. F. Walker Was a Forger. HARTFORD, Conn., March 9.—That W. F. Walker, the defaulting treasurer of the Savings Bank of New Britain, is also a forger to the extent of several thousand dollars was made known. Walker probably will be indicted for that crime by the grand jury at its session Tuesday when the embezzlement charge against him will be considered.

Chicago Subterranean Street. CHICAGO, March 9.—G. W. Fitzgerald, assenting teller of the Chicago subterranean, from whose cage \$173,000 in currency disappeared two weeks ago, will not be restored to employment by the government for the present. He promised to make disclosures of some sort concerning alleged irregularities and carelessness in handling money at the subterranean if he were restored to duty, but later decided to say nothing.

Arrest in Marvin Case. WILMINGTON, Del., March 9.—A man giving the name of John Hart, a fisherman, of Camden, N. J., was arrested at New Castle last night on suspicion of knowing something of the disappearance of the little Marvin child. He has lived for about four months in a hut on the Mardick hill near Kitts Hammock.

Kaiser Entertains Tower Girls. BERLIN, March 9.—Kaiser William carried a bouquet of roses and lilacs to the American embassy and presented it to Mrs. Tower, wife of the ambassador. His majesty also asked to see Mr. and Mrs. Tower's two little daughters, gave them a lot of toys and talked with them for some time about their dog and games.

Alfonso Has a Chill. MADRID, March 9.—King Alfonso is confined to his bed with a chill. His majesty's physicians say that his ailment is not serious.

Not Bound to Shave Negroes. HARTFORD, Conn., March 9.—The supreme court of the state has just handed down a decision to the effect that barbers in the state need not shave colored men.

JOY AT WHITE HOUSE

President's Young Son Is Much Improved.

SINKING SPELL CAUSED GRAVE FEARS

Archie Roosevelt, Very Ill With Diphtheria Yesterday, Was in Low Condition, but Has Now Rallied.

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Following an alarming sinking spell there has been an apparent change for the better in the condition of Archie Roosevelt, the president's third son.

The depression resulting from weak heart action has disappeared, and the physicians report the boy's condition as much improved.

The president told callers that Archie was bright and cheerful and that he was very hopeful of a successful fight against the disease.

Archie is the least robust of all the president's boys, but the attending physicians say this does not necessarily militate against his recovery.

In his visit to the sickroom the president observes the same precautions against infection that are taken by the

physicians, donning a gown similar to those worn by them and washing his hands in a solution of carbolic acid when he leaves the apartment.

The regular cabinet meeting was held, and the president transacted business at the executive offices as usual.

Dr. Lambert said Archie was doing very well and was perfectly conscious and expressed the opinion that he would get through all right.

Despite the fact that the president did not retire until 2 o'clock in the morning he arose shortly after 6 o'clock and at once communicated with Mr. Kennedy, who had relieved Dr. Lambert at the sick boy's bedside.

Mrs. Roosevelt spent almost the entire night in Archie's room. Mrs. Nicholas Longworth telephoned to the White House before breakfast to inquire as to her brother's condition.
