FREIGHT WRECK
BLOCKS BOTH TRACKS

Erie Freight Train Jumps Track at Smithboro and Ties Up Traffic--D. L. & W. Tracks Used.

Waverly--Yesterday morning at 8 o'clock a west bound freight train on the Erie railroad jumped the tracks at a crossover, at Smithboro, and both the engine and eight cars were thrown off the track with the result that both the east and west bound tracks were blocked. The train was not running at a high rate of speed otherwise there would have been a bad mixup. As it was the train stopped quickly, and the cars that were off the track were not badly damaged. The east bound track was soon cleared, but the west bound track was blocked until five o'clock last evening. The cause of the wreck has not been ascertained with certainty, but it is thought that it was due to a defective tire on one of the locomotive wheels. During the time that the track was blocked the Erie ran its trains over the D. L. & W.

Funeral This Morning.

Waverly--The funeral of Owen McDonald, who died last week from injuries received while working in the Lehigh Valley yards at Sayre, was held this morning, and was very largely attended. The members of the C. M. B. A. of which he was a member, attended in a body. The funeral was held at 9 o'clock from his late home, and at 9:30 from St. James church. The remains were interred at St. James cemetery.

WAKES SERIOUS CHARGES.

Captain McDonald Accuses Penrose of Shielding Negro Soldiers.
AUSTIN, Tex., March 11.--Captain Bill McDonald, the former commander of the Texas rangers, has left Austin for San Antonio, to see Major Penrose about the latter's reported statement that McDonald was a "contemptible coward."

McDonald issued a statement in which he says, "Penrose was guilty of shielding the guilty negroes that murdered Natus and shot into the houses of the citizens of Brownsville, and I caught him in the act of trying to cover it up."

McDonald states that after Major Penrose and Captain Macklin had told him and his sergeant, W. J. McCauley, that they saw Corporal W. H. Miller at roll call on the night of the Brownsville raid, Miller told them he was not at roll call that night, but was across the river in Mexico until a short time before the shooting and in a Brownsville saloon when the raid was made.

"I then told Penrose and Macklin that they were trying to cover up the murder," continued McDonald. "I have since understood that Penrose had ordered the negro soldiers to shoot me and my rangers if I undertook to spot them any more."

INSULT OUR MINISTER
Representative Merry Driven Out of Managua.

PRESIDENT ZELAYA RESPONSIBLE.
Nicaraguan Officials Are Accused of Tampering With United States Dispatches to Legation.
Flat Fight Result.

NEW ORLEANS, March 11.--United States Minister Merry has been driven out of Managua, the capital of Nicaragua, by soldiers, his cablegrams and mail seized and the United States flag insulted by President Zelaya.

Mr. Merry at last accounts had closed the legation and was in Costa Rica. These advices were brought here by passengers on several ships from Central American ports. The news is confirmed by a prominent resident of New Orleans, just back from the tropics.

Minister Merry and President Zelaya had a stormy interview following charges that Mr. Merry's official papers and dispatches had been tampered with, and Mr. Merry intimated that Zelaya was to blame.

A flat fight was the result, and guards in the Zelaya mansion had to interfere. When Mr. Merry attempted to close the legation in response to instructions from Washington and board his vessel for Costa Rica, Zelaya sent a file of soldiers to the landing under command of the Nicaraguan minister of war.

The troops pursued Mr. Merry on board the ship and attempted to secure his papers. When the minister of war and his men started up the vessel's ladder Mr. Merry, with drawn revolver, warned them to desist or he would kill the first man who came on deck. Mr. Merry hoisted the American flag and declared the vessel, a foreign ship, to be under the protection of the United States.

The vessel proceeded to San Jose, and that is believed to be the present headquarters of Mr. Merry. It is learned that Mr. Merry was prosecuting a claim for \$30,000 against Nicaragua at the instance of Samuel Well of New Orleans and that Zelaya decided to seize all documents bearing on this matter in order to thwart payment.

THAW DENIES.

Slayer of Stanford White Says There Is No Thought of Separation.

NEW YORK, March 11.--Harry K. Thaw has issued the following statement through his counsel, Dan O'Reilly: "I wish to deny as emphatically as possible the published report that my sister, the Countess of Yarmouth, is desirous of bringing about a separation between my wife and me at the conclusion of the trial. Perfect harmony exists between my wife, my sister and myself, as indeed between all the members of my family. Such a thing as a separation has never been and never will be considered by me or any of my relatives."

"The Countess of Yarmouth is very friendly with Mrs. H. K. Thaw and holds her in the highest esteem. "As for myself, my love of my wife is greater today than it ever was before, if that is possible. I hope that this denial from me will forever set at rest the absurd story of a possible estrangement."

"It is peculiarly regrettable to Mrs. Thaw and myself that such a story should have emanated from the source it did." Thaw wrote the statement in his cell and insisted that his counsel should make it public. The sentence at the end of the statement refers to Evelyn Thaw's brother, Howard Nesbit, who was credited with being responsible for the rumor of a separation.

Oil Wells of Little Worth.

Shallow wells, giving out a good quality of oil, have been discovered around Mexico City, but the flow has been exceedingly limited and explorations are not now being made in that vicinity.

ORDINANCE NO. 24.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors of an electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:
Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds, within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended, for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc., in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times, under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set inside the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on
