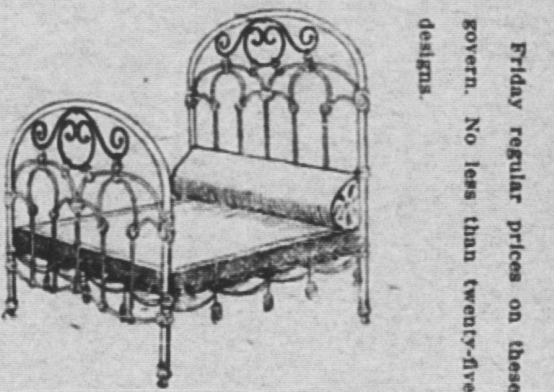

Struck on Back of Her Head and Was Unconscious When Picked Up.

Athens—Mrs. George C. Degroff while coming from the Methodist church last evening fell upon the sidewalk in front of Wolcott's store and sustained a very severe injury. The children had been sliding upon the walk and it was very icy and slippery and although Mr. Degroff had her arm she slipped from his grasp and fell with great force. She was taken up unconscious and removed to her home on Elmira street and a doctor was called. She remained unconscious over two hours and although she knows people she cannot tell what has happened to her. She struck the back of her head and the injury is very serious.

NEW BILLIARD RECORD.

J. F. Poggenburg Defeated Rolfs by a Score of 300 to 100.

NEW YORK, March 7.—The unexpected happened in the eighth game of the amateur billiard championship tournament at the Liederkranz club. The club's champion, J. Ferdinand Poggenburg, who won the national title three years ago, made a new national record in his match with T. Mortimer S. Rolfs of the Philadelphia Cricket club, whom he defeated by a score of 300 to 90.

Poggenburg won out in the fourteenth inning, making a new national record for 14.2 ball line billiards of 21 6-14.

The former amateur record of 19 12-16 for the 14.2 ball line game had been held by Wilson P. Foss of Haverstraw, N. Y., since 1905, but was equalled by Calvin Demarest last Wednesday night in his game with Poggenburg.

Calvin Demarest of Chicago defeated Dr. L. L. Mial of New York in the ninth game of the tournament, going out in the eleventh inning. Mial scored 177. This breaks all record averages for 14.2 billiards.

Medal Golf Play at Pinehurst. PINEHURST, N. C., March 7.—Fred Herreshoff of the Garden City club and C. L. Becker of Auburndale and David Fleming, Jr., of Philadelphia and C. B. Fownes of Pittsburg will fight it out in the semifinals of the annual club championship golf tournament here. The feature of the play was a nineteen hole battle between Herreshoff and J. D. Climo of the Cleveland club, the last four holes of the match being halved and Herreshoff winning the extra hole by a single stroke with medal play scores of 70 and 78.

Jockeys in Hospital. NEW ORLEANS, March 7.—Two steeplechase jockeys, Major and Johnson, are in the hospital here because of accidents, and Major is in grave danger of death. He has not recovered consciousness since being thrown in the race. Johnson was thrown while practicing jumps at City park, his mount rolling on and seriously injuring him. The defeat of Colloquy, the favorite in the fourth race, was a surprise to the bettors, this horse having been a very consistent winner.

Ratnall Gives Them the Slip. TANGIER, March 7.—Ratnall is reported to have escaped from the stronghold of the Ben-Tarous tribe, where he had taken refuge, and to have gone to some practically inaccessible mountain, where he is gathering a large following from the turbulent tribes.
