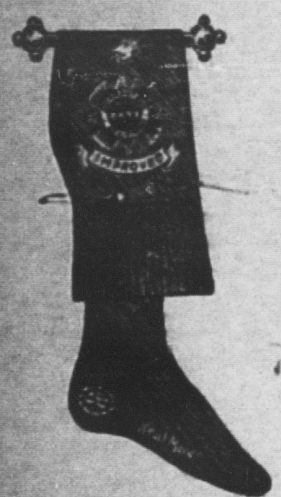

### A NEW DESTROYER.

Japan Testing Torpedoes Operated by Wireless Telegraphy. WASHINGTON, March 11.—Japan has succeeded in building a remarkable torpedo to be fired by wireless telegraphy, according to information received unofficially in the navy department.

Tests of the wireless torpedoes were recently conducted by experts in Japan and were a great success. Details as to the methods by which the torpedoes are operated are not known, but the news has caused general interest among naval officers, who regard this as one of the most important developments in the use of torpedoes. The United States is soon to be given a chance to see an armored cruiser built and armed entirely in Japanese shipyards as an example of Japan's success in naval architecture. This vessel, the Tsukuba, is to be the flagship of the Japanese squadron to visit the Atlantic coast in May in connection with the Jamestown exposition. The vessel carries four twelve-inch breechloading guns, mounted in pairs in two turrets, fore and aft; twelve six-inch rapid fire guns and twelve 4.7-inch rapid fire guns, all of which were made in Japan.

The navy department has learned that the Tsukuba has a speed of 22 knots an hour under natural draft, which is better than the records of most American armored cruisers. It is expected that Commander Takeshita, former naval attaché of the Japanese legation, will come on one of the cruisers to be sent to the United States in the spring. Commander Takeshita, who has many friends in this country, has recently been made executive officer of the first class armored cruiser Iwate.

Says Standard Is Not Frightened. CHICAGO, March 11.—J. A. Moffett, president of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, which company is now on trial in the federal court on a charge of having received rebates, denied the truth of a statement published in local circles in Washington that representatives of the federal authorities that the company might be willing to plead guilty to the indictments against it. Mr. Moffett said: "Any such statement is without any truth or basis of fact whatever. The Standard Oil company is not frightened by any prospect of conviction."

Schmitz and Ruff on Trial. SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.—The trial of Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco and Abraham Ruff, the one time political boss of that city, on indictments charging extortion opened here today. Mayor Schmitz was in Europe when the indictment against him was found, but he voluntarily returned to face his accusers. He entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned. In the meantime Ruff had mysteriously disappeared, but he is now in custody.

Louisville Cars Halted by Strike. LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 11.—With the exception of suburban and a few cars carrying United States mail not a street car moved in Louisville yesterday, the strike of the union employees of the Louisville Railway company having become effective. Although there are nearly 300 nonunion employees out of a total of 1,100, the company made no attempt to run passenger cars. The police had nothing to do.

Taft at New York. NEW YORK, March 11.—Secretary Taft has arrived here to attend the Edison-Maryland Association convention, which opened here.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 24.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors of an electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended, for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, by means of electrical current, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc., in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times, under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set inside the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on poles said poles shall be of sufficient height and the said wires shall be strung at such height above the ground as directed by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 4. All poles, wires, cables, appliances, structures and erections of every kind used or employed in, upon or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds within said Borough for the purpose of the distribution of electricity under this ordinance, shall at all times be kept and maintained in good and proper order and repair and in a safe, suitable and proper condition.

Section 5. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall at all times hereafter save and keep harmless the Borough of South Waverly from any and all suits, actions, damages, costs, counsel fees and expenses of every nature and kind by reason of the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 6. The said Borough shall have during the term of this franchise, without charge therefor, the right to use the poles of the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, for police and fire alarm wires, without hindrance or molestation, using for the said purpose the uppermost portion of the poles.

Section 7. Should the said Company, its successors or assigns, at any time decide to place its wires, cables or appliances or any other part thereof underground it shall have the right to construct the necessary underground subway or conduits under, on or across the streets, alleys, lanes, avenues and public places within the said Borough for said purpose. Said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Borough Council and the streets, lanes, alleys, avenues and public grounds of said Borough shall be kept in as good condition after the work has been done as they were before, and in case the said Company, its successors or assigns, fail to clean up the said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds or make necessary repairs, in that case the Borough shall have the right to do said work, and collect the cost thereof, with all costs, expenses and counsel fees, from the said Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. This Franchise shall terminate at the expiration of thirty-five years from the date of its granting.

Section 9. The said Company, or some one duly authorized in its behalf, shall within thirty days from this date file a written acceptance of this franchise with the clerk of the Borough Council and shall pay the expense of drafting and advertising this Ordinance.

Section 10. A failure on the part of the said Company, its successors or assigns, to fully comply with all the terms and conditions of this franchise shall render the same, and all rights thereunder, void and the same shall thereby be forfeited.

Section 11. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other franchises for furnishing electric light, heating and power, to other Companies.

Section 12. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of South Waverly Borough during the month of January, 1908, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1909, the sum of Sixty (\$60.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1910, the sum of Seventy (\$70) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1911, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1912, the sum of Ninety (\$90.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1913, the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; and a like sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars during the month of January of each and every year thereafter, during the term of this franchise, as a franchise tax. The said sum to be in lieu of all other local taxes.

Section 13. The Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall, during the term of this franchise, furnish Electric light free of charge to the Borough of South Waverly for lighting the Borough lockup and Town Hall both inside and outside.

Section 14. This Ordinance shall be effective after having been properly passed, signed, advertised, according to law, and accepted by the said Company.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted by the South Waverly Council at a meeting held on the Fourth day of March, 1907.
