FIRE IN WEST SAYRE CONFECTIONERY STORE. Flames Did About \$500 Damage Which is Covered By Insurance.

About 9:30 o'clock last night fire broke out in the confectionery store conducted by Mrs. Joseph Watson at No. 104 Lake street, and before the firemen could extinguish the flames damage to the extent of \$500 was done to the building and contents. Mr. and Mrs. Watson occupy living rooms on the second floor of the building and it was in a room on the second floor in the rear that the flames originated.

The members of No. 4 hose company at West Sayre were holding a meeting in their rooms only a short distance from the burning building and as soon as they discovered the blaze they hurried to the scene. They succeeded in getting a stream of water on the fire and in the meantime a general alarm was sounded and the department turned out, and the flames were extinguished. The origin of the fire is not known, but is presumed to have started from a chimney. The loss is covered by insurance.

MERCHANDISE CAR WRECKED THIS MORNING.

Was Crushed Into By a Shift Engine in the Lower End of the Sayre Yards.

A Lehigh Valley freight car loaded with merchandise was wrecked in the lower end of the Sayre yards this morning. The car was badly damaged and the contents scattered about the tracks. A shift engine, moving along at a lively rate of speed crashed into the car, and it took the wrecking crew several hours to clear away the wreckage.

RHODE ISLAND TRAGEDY.

Irving T. Peckham, Insane, Shoots His Father and Then Himself.

AUBURN, R. I., March 13.—While insane Irving T. Peckham, superintendent of the Glenmark Knitting mills of Woonsocket, shot and seriously injured his father, Samuel O. Peckham, here last night and afterward committed suicide. Both men have been prominent in the Rhode Island textile industry.

The tragedy occurred at 496 Pontiac avenue, where the Peckhams lived. When Irving returned home in the evening his father was in the kitchen repairing a chair and did not notice his approach through the hall. He drew a revolver and shot his father in the back of the head before the latter was aware of his danger and rapidly fired five more shots, one of which entered the lower jaw of the victim. Young Peckham then rushed upstairs and as it afterward developed shot himself through the head.

The father tottered to the front door of the dwelling and after calling for assistance fell on to the piazza. He was removed to the Rhode Island hospital at Providence, where the surgeons pronounced his condition as critical.

After laying plans to capture the insane man, who, it was feared, might shoot any person who should molest him, an officer and squad of townsmen crept cautiously up the stairway and found the lifeless body of young Peckham on the threshold of his chamber.

Irving Peckham was thirty-four years of age and unmarried. About three months ago he sustained a fall, which injured his head, and since then he had been despondent at times.

Samuel O. Peckham is fifty-six years old. Up to ten years ago he was proprietor of a large mill in Washington, R. I.

Fifty-three Bribery Indictments.

COLUMBUS, O., March 13.—The Franklin county grand jury, called in special session to consider bribery cases, has just reported fifty-three true bills and ignored four bills. Arthur Beck, former assistant city engineer, has just been arrested and taken to jail.

ORDINANCE NO. 24. AN ORDINANCE granting to the Sayre Electric Company, a corporation of the State of Pennsylvania, having its principal office in Sayre Borough, its successors or assigns, the privilege of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables, and conductors of an Electric lighting, heating and power system, over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys, and public grounds within the Borough of South Waverly, County of Bradford and State of Pennsylvania.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of South Waverly, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, is hereby granted the rights and privileges of erecting and maintaining poles, wires, cables and conductors over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds, within the corporate limits of said Borough, as they now are or shall be hereafter extended for the purpose of supplying light, heat and power to said Borough and its inhabitants for illuminating, heating and mechanical purposes, and to operate, use, maintain repair and extend the same over, under and along the public streets, avenues, lanes, alleys and public grounds in said Borough and for the purpose aforesaid to make all necessary excavations for poles, etc. in any and all of said streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds at any and all times under the following terms and conditions.

Section 2. All poles shall be of good sound cedar or chestnut, reasonably straight and properly shaped, and shall be set inside the curb line at such points as shall be designated by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 3. All wires used shall be of first class quality, properly insulated, same to be properly stayed and maintained, and where strung on poles said poles shall be of sufficient height and the said wires shall be strung at such height above the ground as directed by the Street Committee of the Borough Council.

Section 4. All poles, wires, cables, appliances, structures and erections of every kind used or employed in, upon or over any of the streets, avenues, lanes, alleys or public grounds within said Borough for the purpose of the distribution of electricity under this ordinance, shall at all times be kept and maintained in good and proper order and repair and in a safe, suitable and proper condition.

Section 5. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall at all times hereafter save and keep harmless the Borough of South Waverly from any and all suits, actions, damages, costs, counsel fees and expenses of every nature and kind by reason of the rights and privileges hereby granted.

Section 6. The said Borough shall have during the term of this franchise, without charge therefor, the right to use the poles of the said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, for police and fire alarm wires, without hindrance or molestation, using for the said purpose the uppermost portion of the poles.

Section 7. Should the said Company, its successors or assigns, at any time decide to place its wires, cables or appliances or any other part thereof underground it shall have the right to construct the necessary underground subway or conduits in, under, on or across the streets, alleys, lanes, avenues and public grounds of said Borough shall be placed in as good condition after the work has been done as they were before, and in case the said Company, its successors or assigns, fail to clean up the said streets, alleys, lanes, alleys or public grounds or make necessary repairs, in that case the Borough shall have the right to do said work, and collect the cost thereof, with all costs, expenses and counsel fees, from the said Company, its successors or assigns.

Section 8. This Franchise shall terminate at the expiration of thirty-five years from the date of its granting.

Section 9. The said Company, or some one duly authorized by its behalf, shall within thirty days from this date file a written acceptance of this franchise with the clerk of the Borough Council and shall pay the expense of drafting and advertising this Ordinance.

Section 10. A failure on the part of the said Company, its successors or assigns, to fully comply with all the terms and conditions of this franchise shall render the same, and all rights thereunder, void and the same shall thereby be forfeited.

Section 11. The franchise hereby granted shall not be considered as depriving the Borough of South Waverly from granting other franchises for furnishing Electric light, heating and power, to other Companies.

Section 12. The said Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of South Waverly Borough during the month of January, 1907, the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1908, the sum of Sixty (\$60.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1909, the sum of Seventy (\$70.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1910, the sum of Eighty (\$80.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1911, the sum of Ninety (\$90.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; during the month of January, 1912, the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars as a franchise tax; and a like sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars during the month of January of each and every year thereafter, during the term of this franchise, as a franchise tax. The said sum to be in lieu of all other local taxes.

Section 13. The Sayre Electric Company, its successors or assigns, shall, during the term of this franchise, furnish Electric light free of charge to the Borough of South Waverly for lighting the Borough Lockup and Town Hall both inside and outside.

Section 14. This Ordinance shall be effective after having been properly passed, signed, advertised, according to law, and accepted by the said Company.

The foregoing ordinance was adopted by the South Waverly Council at a meeting held on the Fourth day of March, 1907.
