### STRIKE BREAKERS WERE FED HERE

Disreputable Looking Bunch of Men Who Are to Take the Place of Striking Street Car Employees, Stopped in Sayre This Morning.

Seven Lehigh Valley emigrant coaches, loaded with two hundred and twenty bleared-eyed, cigarette smoking, tough looking specimens of mankind, steamed into the Sayre station this morning about eight o'clock, and under the escort of 12 swarthy agents of the Pinkerton detective bureau, the bunch was escorted to the Wilbur house where they were served with a square meal, the first probably in months.

The men are strike breakers and they are on their way to Louisville to take the place of the street car men who have been on a strike in that city for the past two weeks. They are probably the toughest looking specimens of the human race that the citizens of Sayre have seen in a long time, and they are being shipped to Louisville by Strike Breaker Farley, who has become famous and rich through his methods of furnishing men to take the place of honest workmen.

The train left the 23d St. ferry, Jersey City, about 3 o'clock last night and its cargo of human freight was picked up from the slums of Gotham. Farley has agents in New York and when men are needed to break a strike Farley instructs these agents to get busy. The dives and other places where the out-of-work element hangs out are visited and any man who wants to offer his services is accepted. Black legs and crooks all look alike to the agent and no one is therefore barred from joining the outfit. When the men were loaded into the emigrant cars last night the majority of them were provided with a bottle of whiskey, with the result that after the train had been on the road a few minutes the bunch was most hilariously drunk. At Coxton the effects of the booze had worn off and the men asked to be shown to the dining car. When they were told that they could get nothing to eat until they reached Sayre it looked for a time as if it would be necessary for the train crew to abandon the train and cut to the tail timber. The Pinkertons finally persuaded them to be quiet until they got to Sayre where breakfast had been ordered for them.

As soon as the train stopped here the bunch was marched to the Wilbur house with the Pinkerton men closely guarding them to see that none got away. It appears that the street car company invest two dollars in each man furnished by the agent, and the Pinkertons are instructed to allow none of them to escape.

As a whole the men were a most disreputable looking lot. Some of them wore discolored optics, while the eyes of others were bloodshot from the effects of booze. Some wore threadbare overcoats, while others had no overcoats at all.

When they left the Wilbur house nearly all of them had cigarettes between their teeth. They remained in Sayre about an hour and there were many expressions of approval when the train finally moved out of the station and the town was rid of their presence.

### Accepted Fine Position.

Ira Berger of Miller street, who has been a foreman in the Lehigh Valley shops for some time, has resigned his position and will go to Indianapolis where he is to accept a similar position with the Fairbanks & Morse electrical company. Mr. Berger's family will remain in Sayre for the present. The new position to which he goes is a fine one. The company manufactures electrical supplies and machinery and he is to be a foreman, at a lucrative salary in one of the mechanical departments.

### Overcoat Stolen.

An overcoat was stolen from the waiting room of the Lehigh Valley station at Falling Springs yesterday and two men one of whom took the garment boarded a west bound train. The special officers at Sayre were notified of the theft, but when they received the telegram the train which the men are said to have boarded had reached Sayre and gone. The overcoat, therefore, was not recovered, nor were the thieves apprehended.

### EXTRADITION PAPERS PREPARED YESTERDAY.

New York State Authorities Will Be Asked for the Custody of John Maroney.

Yesterday-afternoon District Attorney Mills and Justice Carey prepared the necessary petition and affidavits for the extradition from New York state of John Maroney, who is now in the Tioga county jail at Owego, charged with burglary in the third degree. Maroney is the man who is alleged to have entered the Sayre house bar and extracted the sum of nine dollars from the cash register. He went to Waverly where he was arrested and placed in jail. Chief Walsh of this place went to Waverly and interviewed Maroney. The latter is alleged to have implicated a companion in the job of robbing the till. The papers in the case will be sent to Governor Stuart and it is expected that he will issue requisition to the governor of the State of New York within a few days.

### SUPERIOR COURT AFFIRMS JUDGE FANNING'S DECISION.

Alton T. Swingle Will Receive Money From Insurance Companies

In the superior court of Harrisburg on Monday, the decision of the Bradford county courts in the Alton T. Swingle vs. the Insurance Company of North America, and the Suh Insurance office, was affirmed, and Mr. Swingle will receive \$1,250 and interest, amounting to nearly \$1,300 from each company. It was agreed that the superior court's decision in one case should decide both, and the affirming of Judge Fanning's decision ends an interesting controversy.

On Feb. 25, 1905, at Laddsburg, the store of Swingle & Kenyon was destroyed by fire. The property was insured in the name of Alton T. Swingle and on the grounds that as the business had been carried on in the firm name of Swingle & Kenyon, the insurance companies set up the claim that there had been misrepresentation, and refused to allow the claims. The case was heard in the common-pleas court of Bradford county, and the plaintiff established the fact that while there had been an apparent partnership, yet Mr. Swingle was the sole owner as Mr. Kenyon, his brother-in-law, was to become a partner when he had purchased an interest, which had not been done. Mr. Swingle won in the Bradford county courts, and the insurance companies carried the case to the superior court with the above result.

### AVOID GET-RICH-QUICK SCHEMES

Projects Which Promise Big Returns Should Be Looked Upon With Suspicion.

The experience of the two hundred or more victims of the investment scheme of James T. Haviland, whose arrest at Scranton exposed his methods, ought to prove a lesson to those who are temperamentally disposed to credulity by the promise of big profits. It is almost inconceivable that men of otherwise sound judgment can be made to believe that there is any legitimate investment which can be made to return them a profit of two or three hundred per cent. Yet there appears to be men of gullibility in every town who will bite on schemes of this character as readily as a fish will jump at bait. Many of these schemes are never brought to light at all, the dupes choosing to pocket their losses rather than to expose themselves to the ridicule of their friends.

It is a safe rule, and one which The Record has always advised to absolutely refuse to have anything to do with any project which promises unreasonable profits. There are of course legitimate investments which yield enormous profits and which have made promoters and others connected with them immensely wealthy. The projects, however, are run strictly on a business basis and are not promulgated by such men as Haviland, and his ilk.

Any business proposition which promises to pay abnormal profits should be looked upon, with suspicion. There are plenty of good investments wherein savings can be made to pay all that prudence and safety warrant, but when some smooth talking individual presents a stock scheme to you by which your little hundred dollars will pay you a salary per week that will almost pay your living expenses, tell him that your time is occupied, and that you will be pleased to have them look elsewhere for a sucker.

Some of the methods employed to separate the gullible from their money are especially reprehensible, since the victims are sought among a class that can least afford to sustain the loss. These schemes are concocted with a degree of ingenuity which makes them particularly alluring to the poor. A dollar a week, a few dollars a month is brilliantly pictured as the foundation for a fortune.

Haviland belongs to that class of glib-tongued artists who make their way through the world by their wits. That is they make their way until they land in jail. Then honest men may have a chance to get their dues. Haviland and his kind are doing the country a better service by being behind prison bars, and the time will come when the promoters of get-rich-quick enterprises in this country will be wearing stripes and earning a livelihood by working for the state. Let the day be soon.
